Our placegetters over the three days were Natalie Miller (1st in W10) Jane Barnett (1st in W45B), Patrick Miller (1st in M14), Noah Poland (2nd in M14), M 16 Ewan Barnett (1st in M16), Lachlan Dow (2nd in M21E), Eino Meuronen (1st in M80) and last but not least Kevin Paine (1st in M85). There were many who had wins on individual days. Congratulations to all.

And a big Happy Birthday to Kevin Paine 85 years young in April – It would be great if we were all as fit as Kevin is but he has set a very high standard which will be hard to reach.

We should not forget the Family Relay. Alison Inglis, Patrick and Tristan Miller won the handicap event. A great effort especially when they are new to orienteering at this highly competitive level.

Congratulations to our two Australian representatives - Lachlan Dow and Oliver Poland. Lachlan was rewarded for some outstanding and consistent results across all the selection trial events including Easter. He will represent Australia in the World Championships in Italy and will no doubt build on his experience from last year's championships. Oliver was selected for the 5th consecutive year to represent Australia in the Junior World Orienteering Championships in Bulgaria in July. We wish both Lachlan and Oliver all the best in their respective events.

A much smaller number of Bushflyers competed in the NSW Sprint and Long Distance Championships around Lithgow on the weekend after Easter. However, there was still quite a bit of success. In the NSW Sprint Championships, the placegetters were Eino Meuronen (1st in M80) and Noah Poland (2nd in M14). In the NSW Long Championships, Eino Meuronen (1st in M80), Lachlan Dow (1st in M21E), Noah Poland (2nd in M40) and Kevin Paine (3rd in M85). Eino had a brilliant Easter period which he continued into the ACT Championship and QBIII. Like a good wine he seems to be getting better with age especially his navigational decision making.

In the ACT Sprint Championship, there were 24 place getters and 10 winners. This is too many to list individually but it was good to see some of our younger juniors like Lucinda Antcliff (W16), Tristan Miller (M14), Jesse Piironen (M16), Ella Cuthbert (W12) and Natalie Miller (W10) have wins. For many this would be their first win in a State Championships. Congratulations to all.

We did even better in the ACT Middle Distance championships with 29 placegetters and 11 winners. Kevin Paine, Tristan Miller, Ella Cuthbert, Oliver Poland, Eino Meuronen and Natalie Miller all managed to follow up their wins in the Sprint Championships. In addition to those mentioned above, Patrick Miller (M16) and Caitlin Young (W14) were junior winners. The Bushflyers were the organisers of this event at Orroral so special thanks are due to all those who helped particularly Ross Stewart (organiser) and Alan Sargeant (course planner). I am sorry I missed these interesting events.

There were also a number of winners at QBIII around Dubbo. Noah Poland (M14A) broke his run of seconds to have an excellent win. Other winners

were Ewan Barnett (M16A), Eino Meuronen (M80A), Alison Inglis (W45A), and Alan Sargeant (M55AS).

Our intrepid social organiser, Toni Brown, has organised several successful events over the last few months. In Rylstone we had a Good Friday swarm at the local pub. I think it was certainly a boost to their revenue with more than 30 Bushies present. Bob Hawkins even won a prize in the raffle (a meat tray I believe) which he had to hand back because of lack of refrigeration facilities. Many experienced the breathalyser on the way home but fortunately we all passed. There was another Swarm at the Poland/Brown residence on 20 June. Also, those working on the computer don't have to worry about poor handwriting. All this information is seamlessly transferred to the finish computing. All this makes life much easier for those working on the computer and OACT should be looking at this system closely if it isn't already doing so. I think it will make our lives much easier.

Most recently several riders from the ACT travelled to Alice Springs by one form or another to compete in the Australian MTB Orienteering Championships. It is the first time that the event has been held in the area. For those in the know, the attraction of several hundred kilometres of mtb tracks could not be ignored. There was also the added attraction of being able to ride to each event.

The ACT assault was led by past World MTBO representative Julie Quinn and partner David Baldwin. Ann and John Scown travelled on a “rollicking road trip” with Rob Jessop, while Steve Truscott flew in from his far south location of Jindabyne. Former ACT orienteer and Australian MTBO rep Mel Simpson flew in from Norway to ride along with her mother, rogainer Jeannie Douglas, who provided the sole bike for them both. Results were good for the girls and not so good for the boys. Julie managed a clean sweep of W21 in all three races, Middle, Long and Sprint. 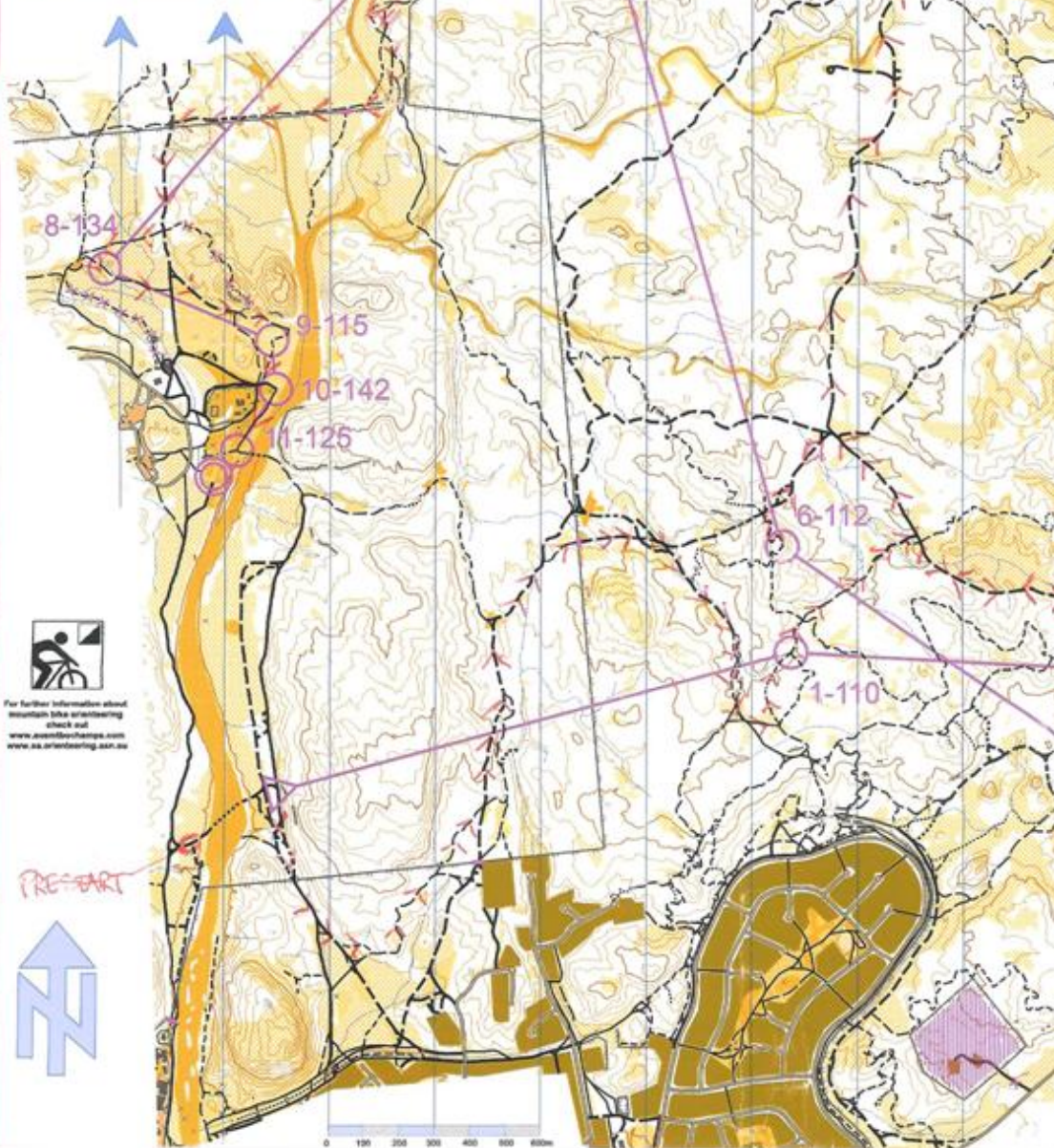

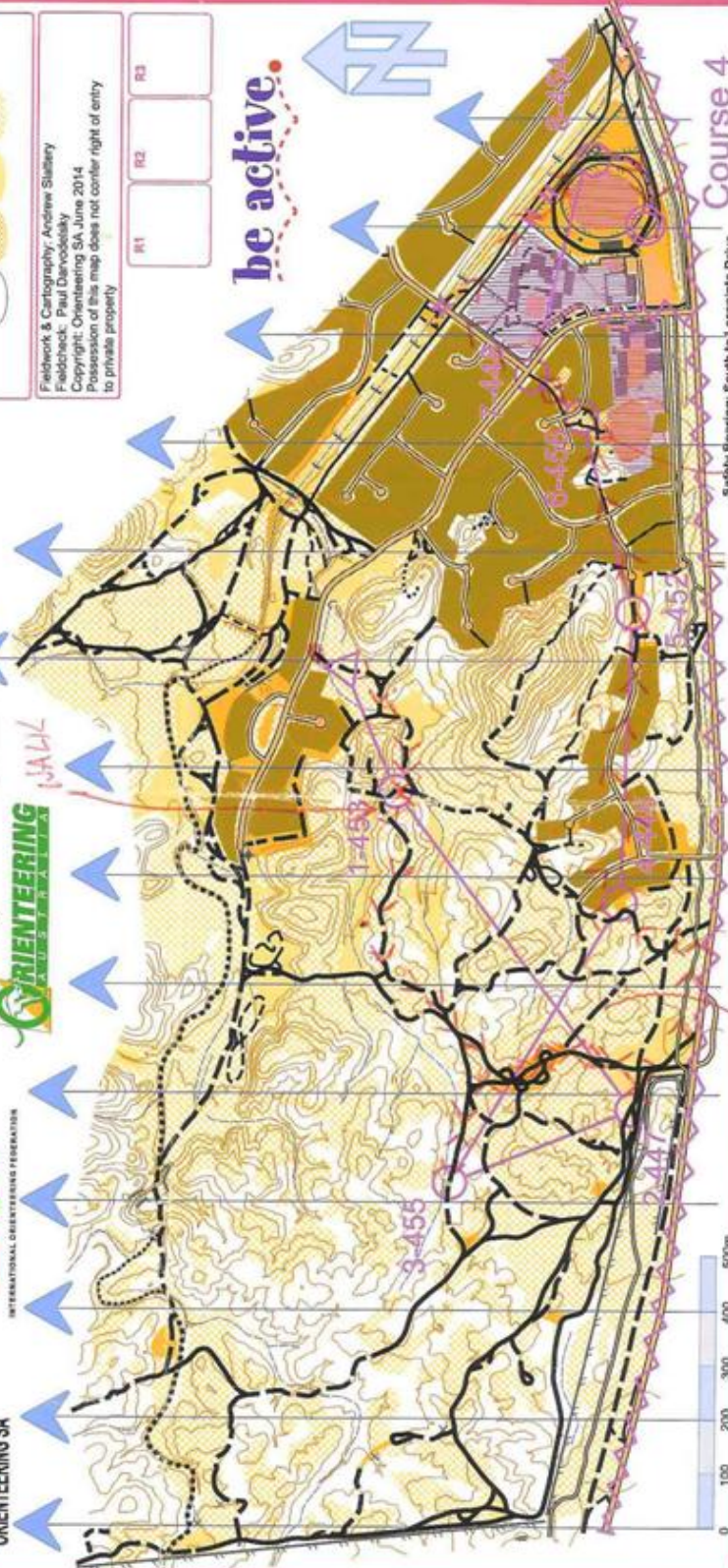
