2016 Australian Three Days Orienteering Carnival, Canberra

The Australian Three Days Orienteering Carnival is in Canberra for 2016. It is also known as the Easter 3 Days as it takes place over the Easter long weekend (25th - 28th March 2016). The carnival consists of a Prologue event (a sprint at the University of Canberra) combined with Family Teams event on Good Friday, followed by three bush events, firstly at Isaacs Ridge on Saturday and then at Yanununbeyan State Conservation Area for the following two days (just 50km from Canberra CBD).

The 3 Days is an awesome opportunity to participate in some world class Orienteering in Canberra. Two events are World Ranking events and all of the 4 events are in areas that will be new for many people. A large number of elites will also be racing, so it's a great chance to watch Australia's best compete head-to-head with spectator controls, radio controls, live commentary & results, and possibly even live tracking of competitors via GPS.

A full range of classes will be offered so you can participate at the difficulty and course length that suits, as well as compete against other orienteers in the same age group from all around Australia.

As well as some great orienteering, we will be looking for a large number of volunteers to help at the event so the carnival runs smoothly. Many hands make light work, so the more volunteers the easier it will be for everyone. Get in early and secure your favourite job.

IOF – International Orienteering Federation - The IOF is the international governing body of the sport of orienteering. The IOF governs four orienteering disciplines: foot orienteering, mountain bike orienteering, ski orienteering, and trail orienteering. The IOF was founded in 1961 and recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) in 1977. There are currently 79 member countries.

NOL – National Orienteering League - The premier interstate competition of Australia's elite orienteers, both on foot and on mountain bike. The NOL (Foot Orienteering) was finalised after the recent Australian Championships in Ballarat with Matt Crane (Canberra Cockatoos) taking out the Individual Senior Men category and the Canberra Cockatoos taking out the Senior Men competition.

WOC, JWOC & WMOC – respectively World, Junior World and World Masters Orienteering Championships – these are currently held annually (and usually independently of each other) and are allocated through a bidding process managed by the IOF.

MTBO – Mountain Bike Orienteering – This is another discipline of orienteering (see IOF above) and like Foot orienteering, Championships are held at the State & Territory level, National and World (Elite, Junior & Masters) levels annually. The Australian Championships are on in Victoria 7th and 8th Nov.

Red Roo Noos

Goodness me - the past few months Red Roo orienteers have been sighted from Sweden, France and Scotland to Kingaroy and Creswick/Ballarat. The international and state orienteering events that occurred over the past months had Red Roos members orienteering in the varied marsh terrain to intricate gold mining diggings. European friendships were renewed in Gothenburg at the Masters and after orienteering events, walks, tours and bike rides were organised in other parts of Europe with these activities often the highlight of travelling overseas to compete in Orienteering events.

The **Australian Championships Carnival** (Creswick/Ballarat 26 September - 4 October), has just finished with 850 entrants, held in cool weather initially then warm to hot for the last weekend. The terrain was complex gold mining area where gullies, ditches, water races, mounds, pits and washouts were common, with steep and often impassable gully walls. Mutterings were heard about how a 2.2km course (for older classes) could prove so difficult and take nearly an hour!

Victorian Middle distance Championships at Creswick Diggings

Judy Allison placed 2nd in the intricate gold mining area and Emily Alder placed 3rd in W17-20A **Australian Middle distance Championships at Petticoat Gully**

Great to see John Sutton (M75A) and Belinda Allison (W40A) winning their age classes.

Australian Sprint distance Championships at St Patrick's College, Ballarat

Judy Allison W65A and Emily Alder W20A won their races set in a complex urban school campus. Tate Needham and Anita Scherrer achieved places in their respective age classes.

Australian Schools Championships

Congratulations to Red Roo members Oliver Mill, Emily Alder and Zac Needham who competed for ACT in the Australian Schools Championships which were run during the week. This year was the first time the students ran a sprint distance race. They also ran an individual forest race as well as a relay.

Australian Long distance Championships at Chapel Flat

These courses had more spur/gully running with areas of thick vegetation and less complex gold mining. Elite orienteer Jo Allison had a dominant run in W21E and won by over 9 minutes. The longer race suited Jo's fast and accurate tough running. Special mention should be given to Jenna Linehan who was 1st in W21AS which was a great result.

Australian Relay Championships

Dave Shepherd was a member of the Canberra Cockatoos relay team (senior men) who won easily from the Victorian team. After Dave's long absence from orienteering due to injury it was great to watch him running the shorter middle distance races and adding points to the Cockatoo point score.

Have to mention the M65A age class relay team of Hugh Moore, Bill Jones and Bob Allison who were beaten by a WA Team by 1 second! So who did not orienteer well enough to make up the 1 second?

World Masters Orienteering Championships, July

The general talk about the event was the wet weather and the Swedish summer which was cool, cloudy and no hotter than 20 degrees. The maps had numerous bogs and marshes, and mention was made that shorter orienteers feared they would disappear in the mud and never be found. Jo Allison, running her first Masters, ran brilliantly in the W35 Long, coming 4^{th} and was also was 6^{th} in the Sprint. Below is a short report Jo wrote about the Red Roo competitors.

A few Red Roos travelled overseas this year and competed in the World Masters held in

Gothenburg, Sweden in July. Rumour has it that certain Roos had some adventures getting there. Our Roos, let's call them "Hugh" and "Karen", were separated from their luggage which went for a train ride without them. Fortunately there was a happy ending, as after a chase they were eventually reunited with their bags. It's a pity Hugh already has his Pink Pine cone life achievement award...

It wasn't the most summery of summers in Gothenburg and the week of the Masters was a wet one. It has always impressed me how Swedes just get on with things regardless of how miserable the weather is. On with the wet weather clothes and gumboots and off they go. But as their saying goes, "there is no such thing as bad weather just bad clothes".

The days of the qualifications were particularly soggy. As the rain poured down, we sometimes felt like we would rather be in a warm dry Gothenburg coffee shop eating cinnamon scrolls than going orienteering. However, it's always the way that once you get going, and after taking that first reluctant step into a soggy marsh, getting wet doesn't matter anymore.

Despite the weather, it was a very enjoyable week. The sprint qualification and final were held in an urban area and tested the speed of the legs. The long races took place in a popular recreation area on the edge of the city. It was fantastic, challenging terrain with plenty of cliffs and marshes. The sun came out for the last day, the long final, and everyone enjoyed a good atmosphere, and exciting orienteering. A nice way to end a fun week. **Jo Allison**

World Masters at Gothenburg, Sweden

In late July nine Parawangans ventured to Gothenburg on the west coast of Sweden for the 2015 World Masters Orienteering Championships, joining a strong contingent of ACT representatives enjoying the competition, sightseeing and socialising. Several Parawangans made the A finals against very strong competition from the Europeans who seemed very much at home in the mud and marshes. For those of us who have not experienced the Swedish orienteering terrain, the World Masters was an eye opener to the challenges of maps with hatched blue as the predominant colour. However, once



you got over the shock of seeing the map detail, the orienteering skills needed to get around the course were not much different to those needed for any complex orienteering area, except



perhaps making sure you still had your shoes on each time you pulled your foot or leg out of the mud and water.

Unfortunately the weather at the start of the championships was not a typical Swedish summer, (according to the locals), but it did get better and drier as the week progressed with the day for the Long Final being glorious sunshine.

The event organisation was excellent and Gothenburg is a pleasant easy liveable city. All events were within a short distance of the city

centre with the excellent public transport system being used as the main event transport.

The photos above are of Barbara Martin striding out at the sprint final and Ann Ingwersen on one of the less muddy tracks at the Long Qualification Number 1. The early starters for this event had the added difficulty of a torrential downpour that greatly reduced visibility in the already dark and gloomy forest.

World Masters orienteering in the heartland of orienteering is a great experience to challenge your skills, to gain an appreciation of the sport at the highest level and to immerse yourself with thousands of like-minded athletes enjoying the sport.



Summary of Council meeting #67 held 27th August 2015

Below is a summary of the main points from the OACT Council meeting held 27th August:

The OACT Program (2015- 2016)

The Twilight Program was endorsed with the following points:

- ➤ Bob Mouatt recorded his concern about the early start to the Twilight program; this gives too little time for the maintenance/upgrading/time changes of the computers after the winter program.
- It was confirmed that the very successful Map Mates program should be continued, on the first four events of the Twilight program. Council endorses this very successful initiative and thanks David Poland for his development and management of Map Mates.

The Winter Program was endorsed with the following points:

- ➤ Bob Mouatt recommended that Easter Day 1 (Isaacs Ridge) should be an AL event. This was agreed to by the meeting. (It was noted that there is active and ongoing discussion about the use of Isaacs Ridge for mountain biking).
- The meeting agreed to include the Sunday 3 April NSW event at Snowhills as an AL event.
- David Poland noted that Florienteering is at present only a 2015 event, and should not be included in the 2016 calendar.
- The meeting also requested that a Map Mates program be included.
- ▶ David Poland asked that a (provisional/conditional) date be set for the High School Champs it was suggested that this be the same as the ACT Sprint Champs, 5th March 2016. The meeting agreed, asking that this arrangement be revisited after this year's championships.

Membership Fees

- > It was endorsed that:
 - o the membership fees for 2016 remain at the same level as for 2015.
 - o event fees for 2016 remain at the same level as for 2015.
- > Street-orienteering fees It was carried that consideration of a differentiated fees structure for Street-Orienteering be held over until the next Council meeting, in November.
- Season pass for Twilight series.
 - The OACT Board recommends having a Season Pass for the Twilight series, priced as before (ie charged at the rate of 10 events)
 - Consideration of a half-season pass for January to end of season will be made at the November Council meeting. A condition would (continue to) be that a purchaser of the pass would need to be a member, and have their own SI stick.
 - The motion was carried that the season pass for 2016 would be \$100 full member,
 \$70 for concession, and \$250 family.

MapMates

It was agreed that participants are charged for 4 events and are issued a "free" Season Pass, and free hire of SI card/number; that is, maintain the current costing structure.

Fees for e-Sticks

There were three proposals. After discussion on each proposal, the first two were not accepted. The third proposal was that 'e-Sticks are available for sale at all events for \$55. They can be bought back by OACT for \$35. Some concern was raised that there be suitable control over the sales, and that records of sales are managed through the office

appropriately.' This was agreed to, noting that e-Sticks should not be sold as part of the registration desk process but sold separately. It was suggested that the welcoming person at events (if such a job continues to exist) would be the most appropriate sales point.

Sporting Schools Report (Toni Brown)

- Toni Brown was thanked in her absence for this report and for the work that she is doing. As it was received quite late, it will be circulated electronically to all Council members.
- ➤ The issues of sustainability of the programs were noted. The issues raised will be considered (as a priority) at the next Board meeting, and a proposal for funding will go to the next Council meeting (November).

Grants Applications

- The meeting was reminded that OACT receives triennial funding through SRS, an Operational grant.
- Michael Burt reminded the Council that the repairs and upgrading of equipment that David Poland suggested grants might be used for should be done anyway, irrespective of the success of any grant application/approval, especially since we are in a strong financial position.
- In general, if anyone is willing to do a grant application, then this is to be encouraged. However, the meeting was reminded that grant applications need to be carefully targeted and will not be given for what might be considered operational needs. Bob Mouatt suggested that the purchase of the Schools Kits might be a suitable target for grant funding.
- > Details of grant funding and consideration are available on the SRS website.
- An item will go into the e-bulletin to make members aware that grant applications are to be made very soon. Offers from members to pursue applications are welcome; any proposals should go directly to Geoff Wood as ED, before 14th September. The SRS link will be provided on the OACT website.

Eventor

➤ The Eventor point of contact appears to be a little problematic. (Editor Later note – a problem has been identified and is being addressed).

Courses offered at Saturday & Twilight events

➤ The issue was raised of the nature of the courses that are offered on Saturday (and Twilight) events, suggesting that here has been some inconsistency at recent events. It was suggested that there be three Orange events, with one long one (in lieu of Red courses). It was also noted that course planners should be mindful of providing a course which is appropriate for our older orienteers. There was general agreement about this. Michael Burt to action.
