## President's Report – Phil Walker

2019 was another very successful year for Orienteering ACT.

Descriptions of events held, coaching and development programs provided, membership numbers, participation numbers, OACT's financial position and the valued contributions from our members, are highlighted through this Annual Report. It shows an impressive list of achievements and shows that Orienteering ACT is in good health.

2019 did present several challenges and opportunities, and Orienteering ACT responded well to those circumstances. Foremost was the hugely successful Oceania Carnival, requiring the co-ordination of effort across Orienteering NSW, Orienteering VIC and Orienteering ACT in locations three or more hours from Canberra. Orienteering ACT had the lead to deliver the Oceania Carnival in conjunction with the Australian Championships and the Australian Schools Orienteering Carnival. Thank you to Stephen Goggs for all his time and effort orchestrating the Carnival. Stephen's report is including in this Annual Report.

Pleasingly 2019 saw a resurgence of Mountain Bike Orienteering thanks to the personal drive of Marina Iskhakova and the Orienteering ACT's MTB community.

Another welcome development was the increasing involvement of junior orienteers in course setting, mapping, promotional activities and support of their peers and novice orienteers. This bodes well for the future.

Behind the scenes, members of the Orienteering ACT Board and Council have continued to deliver with a range of governance, relationship and administrative functions. We continue to have good working relations with ACT Government for access to Namadgi National Park, Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve and the Canberra Nature Parks and we have been an active contributor to the development of the draft Canberra Nature Park Management Plan.

Orienteering ACT is continuing to strengthen our relationship with Orienteering Australia and the States to share ideas and in the case of Orienteering NSW to hold double-header events in locations attractive to members of both Orienteering ACT and Orienteering NSW. This serves to reduce the course setting and organisation effort on our members whilst offering greater competition for our members.

In the last months of 2019, Orienteering ACT lead by Tate Needham established a new series of events for Sprint orienteering that has proven to be popular and serves as a test bed to deliver orienteering with simplified technology and organisation effort. This program will be evaluated in early 2020 to determine whether the initiatives introduced in the sprint series can be used in any of the other event series provided by Orienteering ACT. The aim is to reduce the complexity for event organisation to make it easier for our members who volunteer to organise events.

2019 ended with everyone's thoughts on the bushfire crisis in our orienteering backyard. Several Orienteering ACT members were directly affected by the fires through loss of property, events were cancelled due to hazardous air quality, one event replanned due to a total fire ban and it seems that some of the areas used for the 'traditional' orienteering bush events have been burnt.

Maintaining access to quality bush orienteering areas and sourcing new locations are looming to be the key challenges for orienteering across Australia. Orienteering ACT is losing some bush areas due to more restrictive access conditions, however the good news is that through the efforts of a core group of our members, Orienteering ACT has been able to secure access and map new locations for bush events in 2020 and beyond.

Orienteering ACT is managed and events delivered by our volunteer members. My personal thanks to the OACT Board members, the OACT Council members, Paul de Jongh (OACT Office Administration) who continues to provide exceptional service and Geoff Wood (OACT Executive Officer) for putting together this Annual Report.

Finally, thank you to all the members who have taken on roles for the delivery of activities, programs and individual events.

## **Executive Officer's Report- Geoff Wood**

During the year, OACT conducted 103 local orienteering events that were open to all the public, plus the Oceania events. These events were made possible by our members who volunteered to organize them, and by our members and members of the public who participated in them.

We keep a record of our volunteers who are the course planners, event organisers and controllers for events. In addition there are many other volunteer roles of which unfortunately we do not keep a full record. These roles include setting up before the event, manning the registration table and computer table, packing up after the event and collecting the controls. To all the volunteers, OACT thanks you.

The tables below list the organisers and course planners for each of our League, Twilight, Saturday, MTBO, Ski and Mid-Week events and in the case of the League program the controller.

Orienteering ACT provides for the following types of club memberships for which different membership fees apply: Single Adult Member \$60 pa; Single Junior Member \$50 pa; Family Memberships \$80; and Life Member. In terms of numbers we refer to Members and Memberships. A family Membership is one Membership consisting of a number of members. A single (or junior or life) Membership is one Membership consisting of one member.

The Orienteering Australia state registration fee is based on Memberships. This will be changed in 2020 and will be based on the number of all adult members.

Table 2 shows breakdown of membership: males, females, juniors (20 years and younger, ie born after 1998), Seniors (21 to 34 years, ie born in 1985 to 1998 incl), Masters (35 to 55 years, ie born in 1965 to 1984 incl) and Super Masters (over 55 years of age ie born in 1964 and before). Super Masters is not an official age classification but I have included it here to track the ageing of the membership.

Referring to Table 6 above, the reason why the "sub total" is greater than the total number of day members is because some day members participated in more than one program. Many day members participated in teams (or groups) at the Easy course and the Very Easy course level. Over half of the day members (558) participated in one event only (562 in 2018 and 482 in 2017). 70 day members participated in 10 events or more, doing 1163 participations.

The Day Member figure is important because when we apply for grants from the ACT Government, a figure they want is the number of persons who do orienteering in Canberra.

In addition, 187 children who took part in at least one SC-ORE (school) event were day members who did not take part in any other orienteering event.

#### <u>Membership – Program Participants – Associate</u> Members

OACT has nil members in this category.

#### Membership – School Programs

This category is the number of children doing orienteering as a school activity. Our main activity was Sporting Schools. 2368 school children did 9453 participations in School Orienteering Programs in 2019. See Sporting Schools Report.

#### Membership – School managed programs

Canberra Grammar School and Radford College provide orienteering training on school day afternoons from within their own resources. The Radford students joined various OACT Clubs and their memberships are recorded as such. There are no other school managed orienteering programs.

#### Participation at Public Events conducted by OACT

Refer to Table 8 below. The difference between 'Entries' and 'Participations' is that 'Participations' counts all members of a team (or group) separately, whereas Entries counts a team as one entry.

The League events do not include the NSW events held in May conducted by ONSW but which were also OACT League events. The ACT Long Distance Championships and Middle Distance Championships were both OACT League events and ONSW State League events, hence the large numbers attending. The 2019 Oceania events are not included here as they are not regular OACT events.

The table above (Table 9) analyses participation by club members, Grammar School clubs, interstate members and day members. Day members tended to like street orienteering and also the Twilight and Saturday program in which they had a tendency to take part in teams. The Grammar School clubs attended overwhelmingly the Saturday program. Because of the joint NSW State League and OACT League events, the ACT League program had a high uptake by interstate members. Club members consisted of about 60% of all participations. Referring Table 9 above, OACT Club members had 6,257 participations. Dividing that figure by the number of club members (494), the average participation per club member was 12.7 events. This compares to 12.4 events in 2018, 12.8 events in 2017, 13.3 in 2016 and 14.4 in 2015.

Some 104 of club members did not participate at all. (106 in 2018, 92 in 2017). They fall mostly into the following categories: member of a family membership where other family members are active; members who have left town, and (unfortunately) some new members who disappear as soon as they become members.

## **Street Orienteering**

39 Street orienteering events were held in 2019.

In 2019 John Harding was the street orienteering coordinator and his important function was to seek volunteer organizers for the actual events. To facilitate the task of the organizer, John Harding prepared and printed the maps based on the hand-drawn courses by most organizers while Geoff Wood prepared the results and administered the takings. Day members made up the majority of street-O participations and Day Members contributed to organizing events. Only about 12% of street orienteering day members tried bush orienteering events.

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## **Officiating and Coaching Accreditation**

Controllers work with event organizers and course setters in ensuring that events are run correctly with no errors and things are not overlooked. It is OACT's policy that all events at Group C2 (that is, League events) level and above (such as championship events) should have an accredited controller.

A controller workshop was held on Saturday 10 November 2018 at the OACT Office. The presenters were David Hogg, Ann Scown and John Scown. The attendees were Phil Walker, Jon Glanville, Tony Garr, Paul de Jongh and Michael Burt. The previous workshop was held on Saturday 12 November 2016 and no workshop was held in 2019.

At the end of 2019, accredited Level 1 Controllers were: Bryant Allen, Valerie Barker, Toni Brown, Ian Elz, Tony Garr, Jon Glanville, Marina Iskhakova, Tate Needham, and Anita Scherrer.

Level 2 controllers were: Michael Burt, Cath Chalmers, Keith Fifield, Jenny Hawkins, Grant McDonald, Hugh Moore, Ross Stewart, Eric Wainwright, Phil Walker and Geoff Wood.

Level 3 Controllers were: Bob Allison, Bruce Bowen, David Hogg, Bill Jones, Ann Scown, and John Scown.

<u>Vetting</u>. Group 3C events (which are the majority of our events) do not need controllers although they can. Some clubs have appointed vetters to check over the course setting.

#### Coaches

At the end of 2019, OACT had 7 accredited Level 1 and above coaches: six at Level 1 (Toni Brown, Paul de Jongh, Shannan Forrest, David Poland. Tate Needham and Anita Scherrer), and one at level 3 level (Gareth Candy). There was no change to the accredited coach list as at end of 2018.

## Communications

During 2017 a decision was made to no longer produce the OACT Quarterly newsletter 'News'. The last printed edition of the newsletter was September 2013, after which it was electronically distributed to members with the final edition dated September 2017.

The Annual Report is distributed electronically with printed copies available to those who attended the annual general meeting or specifically requested it.

The weekly e-bulletin continues to be distributed by email from the OACT Office.

As at 31 December 2019, the weekly e-bulletin email (Mailchimp) List was 1,461 contacts which includes 1,068 subscribers. The membership List was 342.

OACT maintained Facebook and Twitter accounts.

#### **Grants and Sponsorships**

## ACT Government Sport and Recreation Services (Active Canberra)

OACT was supported by the ACT Government Sport and Recreational Services (Active Canberra). During 2019, OACT received an annual Operational Assistance grant of \$26,000. This grant was for the third year of the current three year program that will expire at end of 2019. This grant does come with conditions in that OACT is required to be forward looking, is adaptive and innovative. A consequence of the grant is that it places OACT in regular contact with the Canberra sporting community.

OACT also was granted funding of \$15,000 from Sport and Recreation Services to support our elite orienteering team, the Canberra Cockatoos in the National Orienteering League (NOL). This support will be mostly in the form of travel, accommodation and uniforms for the relevant months in the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 financial years.

OACT acknowledges the ongoing support of the Runners Shop, 76 Dundas Court Phillip through its sponsorship of the summer twilight series and through its discount scheme for members who purchase items from the Runners Shop.

## **2019 OA Awards Citations**

## THE MIKE CASSELLS AWARD FOR SERVICES TO ORIENTEERING

The Mike Cassells Award for Services to Orienteering in the ACT was introduced in 1991 in memory of Mike Cassells who died following a car accident en route home after the 1990 Australian Relay Championships. Mike had been involved with Orienteering in the ACT since the beginning of 1974 as a competitor, fieldworker, organiser, course planner, controller and administrator. He was secretary of the ACT Orienteering Association during 1975-77, won a number of Championships in various veteran age classes and represented Australia against New Zealand. His death was a great loss to Orienteering and to his family, wife Judy and sons David, Andrew and Graham, who crafted the memento that is presented annually to the recipient of the award to remind us of the significant contribution that Mike made to Orienteering, and that others have made since his untimely death.

#### The 2019 recipient is

#### **Matthew Purcell**

#### Citation

Matt has been involved in orienteering since he was a student at Canberra Grammar. Upon leaving school, he went to ANU from 2002 and as a student at ANU he maintained contact with CGS in coaching in orienteering two afternoons per week. He has continued to coach continuously at CGS for 20 years and conservatively he must have coached 200 young orienteers over the years.

Matt has also set and organised many foot orienteering events over the last two decades, including the Australian

Sprint Championships in 2013 (he also mapped CGS for that event.)

Matt has also managed the IT at the MTBO championships 2016-2018, which included full SI Air in 2018; as well as being the OACT championships, the last event of this championship was also the final round of the World Masters World Cup.

One of the spurs to nominate Matt for the Mike Cassells Award this year was, of course, his management of the IT at the recent Oceania/Australian Champs carnival. However, Matt's contribution to orienteering software in OACT also goes back two decades. He wrote "Event Director" software which was used by OACT for Saturday and Twilight events for the first half of the 2000s.

At Oceania, his implementation and management of the Grammar Code Cadet team of MeOS and all the surrounding physical IT was amazing. Anyone who attended the carnival knows how much fun it was having the big screen tracking runners and also the bank of TVs with results. In addition, the fact that Matt and his team fronted up for 8 massive orienteering events over 9 days was inspiring. In talking to various day organisers it was obvious that they all had warm words for Matt; nothing was too much trouble and he never seemed to be stressed about anything – well, almost never.

Interestingly, Matt was also the recipient of an Audun Fristad Award in 2001. Almost 20 years on he has definitely lived up to "the promising junior" appellation in so many aspects of the sport.

## THE JIM SAWKINS AWARD FOR EVENT MANAGEMENT

The Jim Sawkins Award for Services to Event Management in the ACT was introduced in 2006 in memory of Jim Sawkins who died while orienteering on Sunday 5 June 2006 at Goorooyaroo, after being the organiser/course planner at Farrer Ridge on the previous day. Jim had been involved with Orienteering in the ACT since around 1980 as a competitor, organiser, course planner and controller. He was noted for his attention to detail and his willingness to put in the extra work essential to ensuring that any event with which he was involved was as good as it could possibly be. And he was always willing to take on extra tasks. Jim was the epitome of what an orienteering event official should be. The 2019 recipient is:

### **Cathy Hogg**

#### Citation

Cathy Hogg has been the key person behind the success of the ACT Primary Schools Orienteering Championships over the past six years. In 2014 she was the course planner for the

event (at Mount Ainslie North) and, for the next four years, was both course planner and organiser. She is again organising the Championships in 2019 – to be held this coming Wednesday, although this year she has handed over the task of course planning to her son, Makhaya.

Organising the Primary Schools Championships involves many extra tasks beyond those normally involved in a championship event. Many competitors may be experiencing their first orienteering in an unfamiliar bush environment and, to assist in their safe and timely return, it is prudent to organise a team of experienced orienteers to act as boundary riders and ensure that nobody wanders off the map. The boundary riders are supplied with water and jelly snakes to sustain children who have been out for a long time.

So that all participants gain a sense of achievement from finishing, Cathy designs and prepares special personalised certificates for everyone who enters. Publicising the event,

retrieving from schools the perpetual trophies won in the previous year, and coping with last-minute floods of entries and entry changes or withdrawals are all extra tasks which need to be managed.

While Cathy gets a lot of help from parents and other orienteers in running the event, she provides the 'glue' that makes everything come together and devotes many hours to detailed planning to ensure that the event is a success. She has announced that 2019 will be her last Primary Schools Championships and is no doubt looking forward to a wellearned break.

## Sporting Schools 2019 – Stephen Goggs

With the Sporting Schools and associated primary school coaching programs having been in full swing for three full years now, it is pertinent to make some comparisons between years and therefore about the ongoing robustness of the program.

While 2018 was a comparable year to 2017, there has been a decrease of approximately one third in all facets of schools' activity in 2019 (jobs, participants, encounters, mapping and fees collected) – see data **table attached**. A consistent trend has been that term 1 attracts fewest jobs, followed by term 4. Schools report that this is mainly due to a focus for them on other sports in those terms, especially athletics and swimming carnivals. The decrease for the year is possibly attributable to two other major factors:

- the Sporting Schools funding program has become quite competitive, with the result that a) the application period remains open for a shorter time each term, and there is a greater chance applicants will be unsuccessful.

- the schools coordinator was preoccupied with duties as the carnival director for Australia's major international orienteering competition, Oceania 2019.

Conversely, an emerging experience is that a number of schools are returning for repeat coaching (incl St Monica's, Trinity Christian School, Forrest, Curtin, Holy Family PS), with

a number of them being Catholic schools, who tend to fund their programs from internal resources rather than relying on the Sporting Schools program. There has been less uptake from secondary schools in 2019, but a change of staff at Radford College has been positive for the program there, and students from CGS have been very active in their support for orienteering generally throughout the year.

<u>Coaching</u>: Our scholar 'coaches-in-residence' have again assisted in providing excellent coverage for Sporting Schools jobs. 2018-19 overseas coaches Fredo and Saara were very busy from the time they arrive. This year Polish coach Fryderyk and his partner Maria were also able to commence coaching from the week after they arrived in October 2019.

*Funding:* The adjustment to billing practices in 2018 (10% withholding to OACT across the board) allowed us to offer a small discount to secure repeat business from three government schools during this year without seeking additional subsidy from the association in order to ensure coaches were still paid in full for their work. New flags are being ordered to ensure that all coaching kits are fully stocked with presentable equipment. All SI units used for schools coaching (and SC-ORE) were reviewed by Bill Jones this year, with many requiring replacement batteries for the first time after several years of consistent use.

<u>Next:</u> A planned focus for 2019 on working with outdoor education providers has not progressed, but remains a priority for 2020.

With the new coaches came lots of new and less experienced kids into the squad. We had about 15 new faces regularly attending. Many of these kids were either late primary school or early high school aged, a younger group than previous years. Ken and Mark were great at introducing this next generation of orienteers to the sport and developing their skills.

Blue Lightning training was scheduled for Wednesday afternoons which was also the training day for Radford College orienteers. A lot of our senior experienced Blue Lightning members also attend Radford which meant it was impossible for these kids to attend both sessions. Fortunately

## Focus on Girls Training – Toni Brown

A girl focused series of training sessions was first run in this format in May 2014.

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The series continued in 2019 to encourage girls aged 10 years and older and their parents, to gain greater enjoyment both social and technical, through orienteering participation. In 2019 periodic training sessions were held as two separate series.

At least one girl from Series 1 joined a club for the first time, At least 3 girls joined up with their school squad (Canberra Girls Grammar Junior and Radford).

At least 2 participated at regular Saturday events and went on to attend some events at the Australian Championships. Ken and Mark often worked with the Radford coach Jarrah Day. The sessions would run concurrently, the courses could be shared and the Radford Blue Lightning members still had contact with the Blue Lightning squad. It was an arrangement that worked very well.

We were very lucky this year that Cathy Hogg stepped in as Cake Stall manager to take over from the wonderful Jane Barnett. This year saw the introduction of some savoury items to the cake stall menu. The hot soup option was very appreciated on some of those cold League events. We were successful in raising a \$348 subsidy each for those attending Australian School Championships.

Orienteering ACT was very generous in providing a \$25 subsidy for some new Blue Lightning shirts. We had orders for 29 Byzos shirts from AussieOgear and were fortunate to get them just before the Oceania Carnival. It was great to get some of our newer members some shirts for the carnival.

After two years of being the Blue Lightning Manager, I will be passing the Manager's job to Ken Mansell and some new coaches will be joining the team for 2020.

#### Series 2 –November/December

Coaching provided by Toni Brown, supported by Maria Deptulska.

Sessions were held on Thursday afternoons (moved from Friday to avoid a clash with coach in residence sessions). Sessions were 4-5.30pm at the following venues: Registration for the FOG sessions was done through Register Now with a \$10 registration fee to cover costs of maps and afternoon tea.

## Development Officer Report – Susanne Harrysson

#### The permanent orienteering courses

#### Goulburn

The new permanent orienteering course in Goulburn lost one of its controls when a building was taken down! The control has now been replaced nearby. The map has been updated. The courses need to be adjusted for the new control.

#### John Knight Memorial Park

Three controls have been replaced (were missing or needed replacement). The rest of the controls are intact.

#### **Fadden Pines**

The park has undergone maintenance work etc and the map has been updated by Bob Allison.

#### **Eddison Park**

Controls have been checked and some have been replaced. Weston Park, Haig Park and Tidbinbilla

These parks need minor updates or to be checked. Ongoing.

#### \* SC-ORE

**Spring SC-ORE 2019** had just finished. It was the biggest series so far with 180 children in 45 teams from across Canberra. It was held at St Thomas More's, Ainslie, Turner and St Joseph's Primary schools with the last event on the 14th of November.

New locations for **Autumn SC-ORE 2020** have been just been approved, the exact dates for each school have not been decided yet, but the series will be held four Thursday mornings in March 2020 (5th, 12th, 19th and 26th). St Monica, Lyneham, Majura and Maribyrnong – Belconnen/Inner North.

(Statistics Note: 218 children attended at least one SC-ORE event during the year. 77 children attended both the Autumn and Spring SC-ORE events. 18 were OACT club members and another 13 attended other (non-SCORE) OACT event as a Day Member. This means that 187 of those children did not attend other OACT events. It is not analysed whether the 18 club members and the 13 Day members became club members / day members-at-other-events, as a result of SC-ORE or whether they attended SC-ORE as a result of previous OACT involvement as club or day members)

#### \* Orienteering programs to schools (Sporting Schools)

In Stephen Goggs absence I have coordinated the delivery of our school coaching programs. The new Fadden Pines map has been used for the program delivered to Holy Family Primary School. The school had chosen to include orienteering as the options for their students in a Thursday Sport's program among other sports. They were very happy with the program, and asked for a repeat for more students the following weeks (ongoing now). Programs are now also being delivered to Holy Spirit and Forrest Primary. The latter a regular school nowadays. The 4-week-program to the Islamic school was completed last week.

\* New school maps have been made, or are being made at the moment: Bonython, Lyneham (for autumn SC-ORE 2020), Holy Spirit Primary in Nicholls, (We are hoping to get Gold Creek Primary engaged as well, so we can combine the schools and St Paul II college as well into a bigger map.) as well as Wanniassa Junior School Campus and updates of Majura Primary.

## **Finance Report**

For the past few years Peter Miller has been our treasurer and we are lucky that Peter has been able to do this. The treasurer role is a huge task and I think many members do not fully realise this. Geoff Wood has been assisting Peter in managing the PayPal account, and also in preparing the accounts for the audit, in other words, doing what could be called an internal audit. There is nothing unusual about this; I know of other organisations that prohibit the treasurer from organising the audit.

Since 2017, we have been using an on-line accounting software (MYOB) for which we pay a monthly fee. This means we always are using the latest version of the software. One of the features of the software is the ability to attach (or paste) documents to the software thereby eliminating the need to have folders of physical paperwork. OACT needs to move in this direction. This will require those making claims for payment to do a bit more work in preparing their claims; a quick email will no longer be sufficient. The claim will need to be in an attachment to an email, so that the attachment can be pdf'ed and pasted.

Some members might say they are so busy volunteering for orienteering that they don't have time for paperwork as discussed above when preparing their claims. But they are not eliminating the paperwork, all they are doing is shifting the paperwork onto the treasurer. The only way to eliminate the paperwork is to eliminate money.

The Accounts – Goods and Services Tax (GST).

OACT is a GST registered organization. The accounts are shown on an ex-GST basis which is the reason that most of the figures are not rounded. For example, our most common event fee \$10, is not actually \$10, but rather \$9.09 plus GST and it is that \$9.09 that is reflected in the accounts. The same analogy applies to our other income. Many of our costs also include GST which the supplier has paid, and which we can claim as a GST credit. The accounts show those costs minus the GST credit.

To claim the GST credit requires paperwork, that is, a Tax Invoice. In 2019, some claims for reimbursement of costs lacked this tax invoice, meaning we were unable to claim the credit. OACT probably missed out on a few hundred dollars because of this. It is important for members claiming reimbursement of costs to provide the tax invoices.

To give an indication of the impact of GST, during 2019 we paid \$40,651 tax to the ATO. This figure does not show up as a cost because the Profit and Loss schedule is ex-GST.

There are two reports:

The Balance Sheet deals with assets, liabilities and equity.

When OACT spends funds to purchase an asset, such as major equipment or maps, we are not incurring a cost and hence this transaction does not appear on the Profit and Loss schedule. All we are doing is exchanging one asset (money) for the asset we are purchasing.

In 2019, OACT purchased the following assets:

The Profit and Loss Schedule

This is broken down into various sections:

- 1. Income from Sales
- 2. Other Income
- 3. Cost of Sales
- 4. Expenditure
- 5. Other expenditure

Our normal business is: (Income from Sales) – (Cost of Sales) – (Expenditure). This figure is our 'Operating Profit'.

In 2019, this figure was minus \$46.5K. The equivalent figure for 2018 was minus \$41.8K. This figure for our Operating Profit of about minus \$40K to minus \$45K now seems to be becoming the norm. This means we rely on grants particularly the triennial Operational Grant of \$26K and the income we derive from National events such as the Oceania and Easter every 3 years, to remain viable.

I think that the Operating Profit is the figure we should be monitoring because it represents our normal operations. In the attached schedules, the Oceania income is included in the 'Other Income' section of the accounts rather than 'Income form Sales' to reflect that Oceania is not normal in that these national events occur every 3 years.

In 2019, we did well on the grants scenario. Apart from our operational grant of \$26K, all our other grants had spending commitments. For some grants we did not achieve the spending commitments, and this underspend has been moved to the Balance Sheet.
