President’s Report 2021 Phil Walker

2021 was another challenging year for Orienteering ACT (OACT). In many ways 2021 seemed a repeat of 2020 with COVID restrictions impacting all of us in varied ways. Even though it wasn’t business as usual we did have many positives throughout the year. As was the case in 2020, innovation, flexibility and plenty of time and effort from our volunteers meant that we were able to respond to the challenges. Events were held, coaching delivered, our governance remained strong, we are financially secure, and we maintained our very good relationships with the ACT Government, Orienteering Australia and our nearest neighbour, Orienteering NSW.

Unfortunately, once again, the Australian Championships and Australia Schools Championships to be held in Tasmania were cancelled due to COVID associated travel restrictions. These annual championship events are much anticipated by orienteers, none more so than by those junior members who trained throughout winter and gained selection to represent ACT. Hopefully 2022 will be a more ‘normal’ year and we can look forward to a resumption of major championships where orienteers from all States can attend.

Developing our junior orienteers and welcoming newcomers to our sport are two of OACT’s strategic priorities. These have been two of our biggest challenges in 2021. The on and off impact of COVID restrictions hampered our school age-based participation and coaching programs. As we emerge from COVID restrictions, OACT will need to reinvigorate these programs as soon as possible to keep the pipeline of orienteers entering our sport and developing to the best of their abilities.

In between the COVID restrictions OACT held well attended quality events, notably the double header National Orienteering League events in May at Broulee and the ACT Sprint Championships in March at the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA). We managed to get through the majority of the ACT League events, the winter Saturday Metro Series and the Wednesday midday program of events before the August COVID lockdown restrictions caused a halt to all activities. After a delayed commencement, the 2021/22 Twilight series carried forward the innovations put in place during the past two COVID impacted years; over 200 participants purchased season passes and the use of SIAC for contactless control punching has become part of normal practice. Technology enhancements were also made for MTBO with OACT’s purchase of MTB specific SI control units that have a greater range allowing competitors to ride through without stopping to register their control punch.

A National Orienteering League (NOL) competition was squeezed in between periods of COVID restrictions. The Canberra Cockatoos once again excelled on the national stage. The highlight being the success of the 2021 Cockatoos Senior Women, in winning their division of the NOL and being recognised by ACT Sport & Recreation through their selection as one of three finalists for the ACT Sports Team of the Year. The other two finalists were the Brumbies Rugby Team (a professional sport) and the gold medal winning Olympic Rowing Men’s Quadruple Scull.

Gaining access to existing and new locations for quality orienteering events is an ongoing process of negotiations, stakeholder relationships and creative thinking. Prime

locations in Namadgi National Park and Badja will be out of action for a few more years as the areas recover from the 2019/2020 bushfires. Several areas on the fringes of Canberra are having change of landowners and other locations are in need of map updates. Throughout 2021 there were also issues with obtaining permissions for public land access. OACT is working with stakeholders to re-establish the procedures, the timeliness for access permission and the risk management actions. This is not unique to OACT as similar issues have been experienced by the orienteering clubs and association in other States.

Street-O and the use of MapRun built on the success of 2020 offering regular training and COVID safe competition events especially at times when all other events were suspended. A related benefit is that more people have taken the step from Street-O participation to event administration through course setting for Street-O.

Like many other community sports relying predominantly on volunteers to govern the organisation, conduct events and to deliver coaching and development, OACT needs to look forward to how the sport will be placed in 5-10 years from now as we continue to see community wide decline in numbers of volunteers. Will this mean roles previously done by volunteers will be supplemented or replaced by paid staff? Orienteering in the ACT is currently one of the lowest cost sports for a participant, at \$10 per event for an adult

member. Keeping entry fees at that level is only achieved through the use of a volunteer workforce. At this stage OACT intends to remain a volunteer based workforce, we will continue to pursue initiatives to simplify workloads, to encourage all members to contribute what time and effort they can to the sport, and to look at what roles are most at risk should our volunteering numbers and pool of expertise decline.

2021 is my third and final year as the President of Orienteering ACT, the tenure being capped at three years by our Constitution. Two of those three years have been spent in unusual times, leading the organisation as we adapt to the ever changing COVID situation. My job has been made easier by the wonderful support from our Office Manager, (Paul de Jongh) and the OACT Board members, most of whom have been on the Board throughout my time as President. There are many other 'heavy-lifting' contributors who have kept OACT functioning with special mention to; Bob Allison (mapping), John Harding (Street-O), Susanne Harrysson (development and promotions), David Hogg (event management), Marina Iskhakova (MTBO), Bill Jones (technology), Bob Mouatt (event management and promotions), and Ann & John Scown (equipment and event management).

Executive Officer's Report- Geoff Wood 2021

The year 2021 was again impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. No orienteering event was held from mid-August through to early November 2021 because of the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown. The lockdown caused 13 events to be cancelled. These were: 2 League events which were the Championship events; 3 Saturday JL events; 3 mid-week events, two twilight events and three MTBO events including the championships. The figures indicated that COVID preventive measures implemented at orienteering events during 2020 and 2021 negatively impacted on non-members including newcomers attending events.

A bright point was the introduction of regular map-runner events using the Map-Runner technology which uses virtual rather than physical controls. These map-runner events were introduced during the lockdown period and have carried through into the regular street orienteering events.

My report covers data on volunteering, memberships, day (or casual) members, event participation, member participation, officiating and coaching, major award recipients and orienteering performance.

Our Volunteers

Our orienteering events were made possible by our members who volunteered to organize them, and by our members and members of the public who participated in them.

We keep a record of our volunteers who are the course planners, event organisers and controllers for events. In addition there are many other volunteer roles of which unfortunately we do not keep a full record. These roles include setting up before the event, manning the registration table and computer table, packing up after the event and collecting the controls. To all the volunteers, OACT thanks you.

OACT has traditionally allowed non-members to purchase a following-year membership from October and have membership for the remainder of the existing year. The above table includes those members.

Orienteering ACT provides for the following types of club memberships for which different membership fees apply. The fees for 2021 were: Single Adult Member \$60 pa; Single Junior Member \$50 pa; Family Memberships \$80; and Life Member. In terms of numbers we refer to Members and Memberships. A family Membership is one Membership

consisting of a number of members. A single (or junior or life) Membership is one Membership consisting of one member.

Table 2 shows breakdown of membership: males, females, juniors (20 years and younger, ie born after 2000), Seniors (21 to 34 years, ie born in 1987 to 2000 incl), Masters (35 to 55 years, ie born in 1967 to 1986 incl) and Super Masters (over 55 years of age ie born in 1966 and before). Super Masters is not an official age classification but I have included it here to track the ageing of the membership. The Table below does not include the GS-A, GJ-A (Grammar School) clubs

Membership - Event participants - Day (non) Members.

Day members in 2021 are persons who did not belong to an orienteering club in 2021.

The Day-Member data are data is extracted from Reporting.Eventor – Event Participation table with the data cleaned to take into account different spellings etc. Because of this, it is not possible to break numbers into the separate programs.

Some 646 day members participated 2031 times. The 2 COVID years have resulted in fewer day members. The two main reasons are: fewer events that attract new people, and the focus on pre-entry as a COVID measure which is unattractive to new people, despite other efforts to counteract this.

Street Orienteering attracts the most day members. This is followed up with the Saturday and Twilight programs.

Of the 646 day members in 2021, 306 of those did one participation only. 94 did 2 participations. 12 day members did over 20 participations each, with the highest participant doing 37 participations. Most of the high participation day members were street orienteers who do not do other types of orienteering events. This pattern is consistent with previous years.

The great majority of persons participating in groups were day members. Again this is consistent to previous years. However there has been a long term decline in participation by groups.

Of the 646 day members, 299 were female who did 928 participations.

Membership – Program Participants – Associate Members

OACT has nil members in this category.

Membership – School Programs

This category is the number of children doing orienteering as a school activity. Our main activity was Sporting Schools. 1,345 school children did 4,444 participations in School Orienteering Programs in 2021. See Sporting Schools Report.

Membership – School managed programs

Canberra Grammar School and Radford College provide orienteering training on school day afternoons from within their own resources. The Radford students joined various OACT Clubs and their memberships are recorded as such. There are no other school managed orienteering programs.

Club members did 7575 participations of the 9778. Dividing 7575 by club membership size (533), the average club member did 14.2 events. This compares to 2020 where the average participation for club member was 15.1 events. This compares to 2019 where the average participation for club member was 12.7 events. In previous years: 12.4 events in 2018, 12.8 events in 2017, 13.3 in 2016 and 14.4 in 2015. Some 119 club members did not participate at all.

Participation by Individuals, 2021

The following members attended the most orienteering public events in 2021. These figures include dnf's and mp's (did-not-finish and mis-punches). The figures do not count officials – eg if you were present at the event but did not compete because you were course planner or controller.

Officiating and Coaching Accreditation

Controllers work with event organisers and course planners in ensuring that events are run correctly with no errors and things are not overlooked. It is OACT's policy that all events at Group C1 (that is, League events) level and above (such as championship events) should have an accredited controller.

An event management workshop, also doubling as a controller workshop, was held on Saturday 17 April 2021 at Hughes Community Centre, conducted by Ann Scown and John Scown. Attendees included Valerie Barker, Andrew Cheffers, Sue Garr, Susanne Harrysson, Mary McDonald, Colleen Mock, Michael Radajewski, Matthew Stocks. Previous workshops were held on Saturday 10 November 2018 at the OACT Office and then on Saturday 12 November 2016. No workshop was held in 2019 and 2020.

Communications

OACT produces a weekly e-bulletin that is distributed by email from the OACT Office. A separate e-bulletin is also provided focusing on Street Orienteering.

OACT maintains a website that includes News articles expanding on the items covered in the weekly e-bulletins.

In addition, OACT maintains social media accounts on most major platforms. These sites are active with strong numbers of followers ranging from ACT Government Ministers, other orienteering associations and individuals.

Communication channels through sporting expos, School visits and face-to-face community engagement have declined in recent years due to COVID related restrictions

The Annual Report is distributed electronically with printed copies available to those who attended the annual general meeting or specifically requested it.

Grants and Sponsorships 2021

ACT Government Sport and Recreation Services

OACT was supported by the ACT Government Sport and Recreational Services. During 2020, OACT received an annual

Operational Assistance grant of \$26,000 for 2021. This grant was paid early (in 2020) to cover any Covid expenses which was not needed, and so the grant remained useable for 2021. This grant was for the second year of the current three year program that will expire at end of 2022. This grant does come with conditions in that OACT is required to be forward looking, is adaptive and innovative. A consequence of the grant is that it places OACT in regular contact with the Canberra sporting community.

OACT also was granted funding of \$15,000 from Sport and Recreation Services to support our elite orienteering team, the Canberra Cockatoos in the National Orienteering League (NOL). This support was mostly in the form of travel, accommodation and uniforms. Some 50% (3 out of 6 rounds) of the NOL competition in July 2019 to June 2020 did not proceed because of COVID, meaning that 50% of the \$15K funding received for 2019-20 was not spent and that was put aside for 2020-21 year. This meant that \$7,500 actual funding was received for 2020-21 year reflected in OACT 2020 accounts.

OACT has received \$15,000 funding for the 2021-22 year for the same purpose.

Runners Shop

OACT acknowledges the ongoing support of the Runners Shop, 76 Dundas Court Phillip through its sponsorship of the summer twilight series and through its discount scheme for members who purchase items from the Runners Shop.

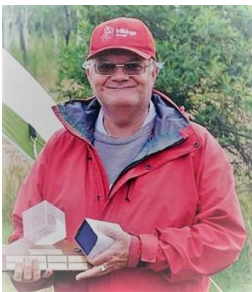

Canberra Cockatoos

The Canberra Cockatoos is OACT's elite team of orienteers and participate in the National Orienteering League (NOL) series of events in a national competition against other state orienteering associations. In 2021, NOL events took place at: Harcourt/Creswick Victoria; Molong NSW (Easter 3-Days); Renmark South Australia; and Broulee NSW South Coast (OACT event) in the period March to May 2021. The Australian Championships held in late September – early October are no longer part of the NOL competition.

Seven teams competed, one from each State plus ACT.

The Senior Women Cockatoos team came first in the competition (75 points, ahead of Victoria 69 points).

The Senior Men Cockatoos team came second in the competition (88 points) following Victoria.

The Junior Women team came 5th.

The Junior Men team came 5th.

Sporting Schools – Stephen Goggs

2021 was a mixed year for schools coaching, with a prolonged lockdown between August and November interrupting our delivery schedule and many schools being reluctant to allow external coaches on site at other times during the year. Nevertheless we recorded 27 separate bookings of different types during the year including:

- 7 four-week programs – at Fadden, St Thomas Aquinas, St Jude's, Holy Family, Trinity Christian School and St Joseph's Primary Schools and the Canberra Islamic School
- 7 longer multi-week programs – at CGS (3), CGGS (3) and Blue Gum Community School
- 5 Secondary school outdoor ed programs – at Trinity Christian School (3), Mt Stromlo HS and Melba Copland Secondary School
- 4 one-off end-of-year events – for Alfred Deakin High School, Orana Steiner School, Bungendore and Wee Jasper Public Schools
- 3 mapping jobs for The Anglican School Googong, Daramalan College and Telopea Park School, and
- 1 Profession Development session for staff of the sports department at Daramalan College.

As a consequence the number of participations and encounters for 2021 was down on the year before, which in turn was already pandemic-affected, but again it was pleasing

to see that once restrictions started to ease our programs remained as popular as ever (see table below).

In the absence of our overseas coaches-in-residence my thanks go to our local community coaches for their willingness to be flexible about program delivery, often at short notice, as schools adjusted to the changing situation, especially Toni Brown, Carys Connick, Susanne Harrysson, Tom de Jongh and Rosie Goggs, and to Patrick Miller and Duncan Currie for their ongoing excellent school mapping work.

During 2021 Orienteering Australia promulgated a new coaching accreditation framework, replacing the traditional level 0 1 2 3 schema with a competency-based framework styled as Orienteering Instructor, and Learn & Play, Competition and Performance Coach. Our existing community coaches will be transitioned to the new framework in early 2022.

Development Officer - Susanne Harrysson

Overall the activity has been low in 2021, due to COVID and the lockdown. Schools have closed their doors and a lot of activities have been cancelled or postponed.

* The permanent orienteering courses

Maintenance has been done on the Canberra courses. A few updates have been made. Most of the controls were still intact.

* SC-ORE (School Orienteering)

Autumn SC-ORE 2021 was run as planned. Some of the adjustments from Spring 2020 were kept in place for 2021. Two of the events were again held at schools although this was before Canberra's 2021 lockdown, and with the major adjustments to the school settings. In fact, the restrictions eased in time for the events, but we had to introduce the QR-code system for everyone above the age of 16. In practice, for parents and carers, not the participants.

There were 112 participants and 28 teams. Aranda D and Aranda B secured a first and second overall place. Hermann Wehner was our award presenter.

Spring SC-ORE 2021 - cancelled

After a long debate and wishes to run Spring SC-ORE it was decided to cancel the series.

The schools were under strict rules to not mix cohorts/age groups, and teachers were putting in a lot of effort into adjustments and to getting it work for all involved. Schools were not letting SC-ORE run on their premises, nor were they willing to promote a sport with mixed age groups and children from different schools participating. Remember, at this point in time, this cohort was not eligible to get vaccinated. Despite restrictions easing overall for community sports, it was decided the risk of a negative impact on OACT if we were to run SC-ORE was too big. Therefore the series was cancelled. Hopes were given to run Autumn SC-ORE 2022 in the following term.

*Plans to let parents try to run a score event has been postponed.

Hopefully it can be done during Spring SC-ORE 2022.

*Hi-SCORE

Plans for Hi-SC-ORE, meaning SC-ORE for high school students in years 7 and 8, have stalled due to covid restrictions in schools. The plan is to pick up the planning again when the school restrictions have eased.

* Promotion and participation in Fairs, School Fete's etc

The number of fairs reduced further this year. Basically no activity at all.

However, an after-school activity with Orienteering was held at Moncreif. This was very successful, and we have been asked to come back again during 2022, as well as to take part in Northside's Sport Fair.

*Orienteering and Triathlon

The proposed cooperation with a combined swim-orienteering run in Black Mountain Peninsula has been pushed further into the future, due to covid.

*Mulligan's Flat permanent course

A map has been made for Mulligan's Flat. The work was delayed due to the covid related lockdown in Canberra. But eventually we delivered a map incl a smaller map to them. Mulligan Flat's received a grant for a permanent course/orienteering, but decided to not accept our offer to install a permanent course. They only bought the map(s). However, we did set some courses, that they have access to, and plan to use for their orienteering activity for primarily school children. The co-operation has been good, and if they need more assistance from OACT, they know how to get in touch.

*Arboretum permanent course

There is no interest to engage OACT in setting up a permanent course in Arboretum. Perceived safety risks for participants and for damaged trees seem to be the reason. They do offer orienteering as a package activity to schools etc and have put up semi permanent markers themselves.

*Hi-SCORE

Plans for Hi-SC-Ore is under way. Hi-SC-ORE meaning SC-ORE for high school students years 7 and 8. IT is not quite as straight forward as it might seem at first, but the aim is to have it up and running in spring 2021. A separate plan will be sent to the board during 2021 when more details have been worked out.

MapRun Report- Lawrie Brown 2021

Following the initial exploration and creation of a selection of trial MapRun courses by Ian Elz, Jon Glanville and Lawrie Brown in 2020, new courses were subsequently developed and used in a selection of regular scheduled events, and for training use particularly during periods of lockdown. These GPS based, electronically punched, courses were particularly suited for use during the pandemic, as participants could access them when wanted, in groups of one or more, as suited restrictions in place at the time. While a number of courses were created for scheduled events, they subsequently remain available for training use for a period of 1 or more years after publication. There has been a small, but steady, such use of these events during the year.

Lawrie Brown and Jon Glanville, as the local MapRun administrators for the ACT region, were responsible for publishing the courses to the MapRun server, and adding information and maps for them to the MapRun Canberra website (<https://sites.google.com/view/maprun-canberra/home>) they maintain. They have also been responsible for guiding and assisting others in creating these courses. By the end of 2021, there were 47 Street, 22 Bush (in 10 locations), 5 Permanent, and 4 Rogaine courses listed on this site.

A selection of MapRun courses were created for use alongside the traditional control plates in Street orienteering events in the first half of 2021, as they supported the use of pandemic friendly, contactless punching at these events. It was encouraging to see MapRun punching being used by a significant proportion of participants. These events are listed in the Table of Street events.

Then during July-August 2021, supported in part by a grant from Sports Australia and Orienteering Australia, we ran a series of eight MapRun only events reusing a selection of existing courses. These were offered during the winter months, when traditionally no street events were run due to low turnout because of the cold and dark. As MapRun courses, these were made available for an entire week,

allowing participants to access them at a convenient time. There was significant interest in these courses, although the last 2 were impacted by the lockdown that started in Aug 2021. They clearly showed this was a viable approach to offering street orienteering events during this period. It also demonstrated that pure MapRun courses, with no physical control plates in place, were accepted, including for the small number of participants who used the manual timing alternative.

During the lockdown period in Aug-Sept, a selection of MapRun courses were either adapted from existing events, or created new, and published. These provided additional options for exercise and training, within the restrictions in place during this period. They are listed in the "Lockdown MapRun" Table below.

With the resumption of organized events from Oct 2021, all the Spring series Street orienteering events were run as pure MapRun events. Again with reasonable, and increasing numbers, though still below pre-pandemic levels. These are also listed in the Table of Street events.

Most of the MapRun courses to date have been based on geo-referenced OACT maps, and these certainly provide the highest quality. However, in late 2021, an updated version of the OpenOrienteeringMap website (<https://oomap.dna-software.co.uk/#/new/streeto-OS-10/11/149.1364/-35.3384/>) from the UK, based on OpenStreetMap data, and now including contours, has provided an alternative for street orienteering events in particular. Using these maps it is now possible to create an event for just about any location that does not need detailed bush feature mapping. A couple of events used older versions of these maps (without contours) in Dec. More events will use these maps with contours in future.

I expect continued exploration of how MapRun can support orienteering events in the ACT region in future.

FINANCE REPORT

Peter Miller has been our treasurer since 2015 and we are lucky that Peter has been able to do this. The treasurer role is a huge task and I think many members do not fully realize this. Geoff Wood has been assisting Peter by managing the PayPal account, and also in preparing the accounts for the audit, in other words, doing what could be called an internal audit. There is nothing unusual about this; I know of other organisations that actually prohibit the treasurer from organising the audit.

The Accounts – Goods and Services Tax (GST).

OACT is a GST registered organisation. The accounts are shown on an ex-GST basis which is the reason that most of the figures are not rounded. For example, our most common event fee \$10, is not actually \$10, but rather \$9.09 plus GST and it is that \$9.09 that is reflected in the accounts. The same analogy applies to our other income. Many of our costs also include GST which the supplier has paid, and which we can claim as a GST credit. The accounts show those costs minus the GST credit.

The Balance Sheet deals with assets, liabilities and equity.

When OACT spends funds to purchase an asset, such as major equipment or maps, we are not incurring a cost and hence this transaction does not appear on the Profit and Loss schedule. All we are doing is exchanging one asset (money) for the asset we are purchasing.

In 2021, OACT purchased the following assets:

Also, keeping track of map upgrades: the following minor maps and upgrades were undertaken in 2021 and costed wholly in 2021:

1. School maps at: Thomas Aquinas School, Fadden School, Queanbeyan School, Daramalan College and Telopea Park School.
2. Bournda map (on South Coast).
3. Mulligans Flat map upgrade (near visitors centre)
4. AIS Map upgrade.

In 2021, OACT received the following grants: \$26,000 as our normal yearly triennial operational funding from ACT Government Sport and Recreation.

OACT has received Performance Sponsorship (National League Cockatoos) funding from Sport and Recreation Services of \$15,000. Some \$7500 of 2019-20 grant was not spent because of the COVID restrictions preventing national competition, and so this reduces the \$15K to \$7.5K. We claim this funding in 2021 and treat it as income for that year, and distribute the funds in 2021.

Other Items: Payments made to Orienteering Australia are: The State Registration fee (a function of adult club members); event levy fee; insurance levy; and Eventor licence contribution (the latter are functions of event participation).

We finish with a Deficit of \$10,544 for 2021. Two items that would have prevented this figure from being much larger is our annual Operation Grant from the ACT Government. Also the Broulee event in May 2021 contributed handsomely to the accounts and this event is not a normal annual event.
