OACT Strategic Plan 2021 - 2024

This section of the Annual Report summarises the [OACT Strategic Plan 2021-2024](#) and OACT's achievements against that Plan.

Vision:

ACT orienteering will be a well-managed, inclusive and growing sport and recreation activity which provides wide opportunities for participation by people of all ages and abilities.

Objectives:

1. To promote interest in the sport of orienteering in the Australian Capital Territory and surrounding areas.
2. To conduct events for those interested in orienteering.
3. To educate, train, coach and encourage people in the sport of orienteering.

Strategies:

1. Make it more attractive to participate:

Our participants range in age from under 10 to over 90, and include world champions, club members, school groups and families. We want it to be more attractive for people to start and to continue all forms of orienteering.

2. Organise events more efficiently:

Our events range from permanent courses, virtual courses and inter-club events, to major state and national events. Our events are run by volunteers and we want to make it easier for them to organise great events.

3. Streamline our administration:

Orienteering is administered at three levels (club, state and national), mostly by volunteers. We want to ease their workload by streamlining our administrative processes.

4. Communicate effectively:

New participants, current members and stakeholders need relevant and timely communication about orienteering. We want to listen, collaborate and communicate with those within and those outside our orienteering community.

5. Perform at our best:

Our participants range from novices to aspiring champions in a range of orienteering disciplines and age classes. We want every orienteer to realise their potential, regardless of their age, ability or chosen form of orienteering.

Achievements to Date against the Strategic Plan:

Progress against the Strategic Initiatives have been assessed as follows:

	Achievements are Satisfactory or better.
	Satisfactory achievements but could improve; dependent on OACT personnel resources available or input required from external stakeholders, (ie Orienteering Australia).
	Achievements have degraded, and actions required to reach a Satisfactory level.

Of the 20 Strategic Initiatives; 14 have a status of Green and 6 at Amber. Initiative 3.5, 'Ensure our sport is financially sustainable and financially attractive for participants to attend events and take up memberships', was rated Red at the end of 2023. The financial position has improved but it remains 'At Risk'.

Details of progress as at end 2024 for achieving the Strategic Initiatives are provided at Annex B.

President's Report - Susanne Harrysson

In 2024 Orienteering ACT (OACT) delivered as many as 129 individual events, likely a new record number! At the same time OACT worked on activities to further streamline administration and event organisation as well as attract newcomers and develop pathways into the sport.

The events span a wide range of formats and disciplines to satisfy our members as well as newcomers to the sport. They included Street-O, Wednesday Midday, ACT League, Saturday Metro, Wednesday Twilight, MTBO, Sprint, SC-ORE, ACT Relays and Ski-O. (Specific number including participations numbers are found inside the annual report.)

2024 was a big year for Mountain Bike Orienteering (MTBO) here in the ACT. Marina and Fedor Iskhakova and their fellow MTBOs worked hard and successfully delivered the Australian MTBO Carnival and Championships in October, consisting of 6 unique events. Apart from the MTBO Carnival additional MTBO events were held during the year - a Development Weekend and several Come & Try events – for skill development and to get more and new people into the sport. Marina and Fedor have worked hard for several years to get MTBO where it is today in the ACT. Hopefully the collective learnings and experiences from delivering the MTBO carnival will encourage more people to participate as well as to share the workload so we can keep the MTBO momentum up into the future.

Blue Lightning with coaches Tara Melhuish and David Stocks plus managers Deirdre Sharkey and Mike Radajewski was successfully run this year again, attracting many of our aspiring juniors to the trainings, week after week. Australian School Championships in Armidale showed that their work with our juniors' has paid off e.g. with OACT reaching a third place in total only a few points after Queensland and NSW. In September Blue Lightning organised a fundraising fun Sprint relay which was well received by the participants. 2025 is looking promising.

In December OACT also successfully hosted and ran the Australian Junior Development Camp which saw 69 promising juniors from all over Australia take part supported by a number of coaches, lecturers, organisers and helpers. Special thank you to co-ordinator Mike Radajewski and all volunteers for making it happen!

Furthermore, we were pleased that Owen Radajewski and Natalie Miller were selected to represent Australia in JWOC (in Czech Republic) and Caitlin Young in WOC Sprint (in Edinburgh, UK). Well done all of you!

Orienteering Australia have initiated several projects on a national level. From ACT we have representation in David Stocks as Project Leader for Introduction to Orienteering, David Poland in the development of the Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), Stephen Goggs around Updates to the OA constitution, Toni Brown as ASOC Co-ordinator and Marina Iskhakova on the MTBO Committee.

In 2024 OACT received a grant from the ACT Government to improve our Planning and Governance in line with the Australian Sports Commission's guidelines. The money was used to improve and facilitate the work of the Strategic Plan for 2025-2030 to better target our wants and needs including better alignment with expectations from external stakeholders. This is an important tool to further strengthen our sport with focus on the ACT – to attract and retain newcomers, to provide training and development opportunities for participants and volunteers, to help us prioritise and to secure long term sustainable finances and more.

This year we have also ventured out on social media with paid advertisement to investigate the channel for attracting new people into orienteering. This turned out to be a successful tool. Next step is to fine tune the advertisement to reach specific targeted groups with customised messages.

Another area worth a special mentioning is the so-called Mesh-O equipment, which has been introduced in 2024. It allows us to track runners in real time at specific controls along the course as well as at the finish. This helps both with live results and safety. We are planning to further expand the network and use of Mesh-O during 2025.

Finally, I want to thank all our members for your various contributions in making orienteering in the ACT and OACT as an organisation what it is. Orienteering would not be the same without you. Thank you!!!

Financial Summary

The 2024 audited Financial Reports are at Annex A. In summary;

- As at 31st December 2024, OACT's financial balance was **\$328,982** with total current assets of **\$276,520**. Compared to the end 2023 financial balance of \$296,076 and total current assets of \$235,292.
- OACT's overall profit and loss for 2024 was a profit of **\$7,914**. This is an improvement on the deficit of **\$31,140** in 2023. The turn-around is attributed to:
 - High attendances at three double-header event weekends, including National Orienteering League events, attracting competitors from interstate.
 - The decision not to engage anyone to fill the vacant Development Officer position – a paid role that was filled for 5 months in 2023.
 - Modest surpluses from coaching activities, merchandise sales the MTBO Carnival and the Australian Junior Development Camp.
 - Increase in memberships.
 - Fundraising activities.
 - Improvements to the process for approving unusual or non-budgeted expenditure.
- Payment to Orienteering Australia of \$10,074 (exc GST) for the event levies for the MTBO Carnival and other 2024 2nd half year event levies, were not paid in 2024. To be paid in 2025. This is not unusual having to pay the 2nd half year levies in the following year, however to be noted that the amount is higher than normal as it includes \$4,967 (exc GST) owing for the MTBO Carnival.

Prior to 2024, the last time that OACT made a profit was 2019 on the back of hosting the Oceania Championships. Losses of less than \$10,000 occurred in 2020 and 2021, largely due to a drop in participation numbers as many events had to be cancelled due to COVID restrictions. Losses of just over \$31,000 occurred in 2022 and 2023, this was despite OACT hosting the 2023 Easter 3 Day Carnival, that returned a lower than planned surplus due to the greater than predicted increases in expenses.

The factor most impacting the financial position is participation numbers attending events. Costs such as Office expenses, salaries, mapping and Orienteering Australia State Registration Fees are largely fixed regardless of participation numbers.

The Auditor assessed that the Financial Report presents fairly, in all material aspects, the financial position of OACT as at 31st December 2024. The Auditor noted that the true value the Non-Current Assets could not be ascertained, with the values reported as arbitrary at best.

OACT's financial position has stabilised, with the forecast of a surplus in 2026 when OACT once again host the Oceania Championships.

Governance

The OACT Board held eight meetings in 2024: 5th February, 18th March, 19th April, 29th May, 2nd July, 26th August, 14th October and 25th November. The outcomes of the meetings were published as news articles on the OACT website. The Event Planning & Management Sub-Committee met twice in 2024 to develop the program of events for the second half of 2024 and for events to be held in 2025.

Executive Officer's Report - Phil Walker

The main stakeholder and governance issues dealt with in 2024 were:

- In early 2024, OACT received notification that the organisation was assessed as a Category 3 State Sporting Organisation (SSO) for the purposes of eligibility to apply for ACT Government Operational Support Grants in 2024-2026.
- Bidding for and being awarded ACT Government Sporting & Recreation grants:
 - \$16,500 for the OACT High Performance (Cockatoos) program for season 2024/25.
 - \$9,000 for the 2024 Club Enhancement Program (CEP) for the purchase of event timing and computer equipment.
 - \$19,180 for the 2024 State Organisation Support Program (SOSP), made up of \$9.1K to obtain assistance to develop the next OACT Strategic Plan, and \$10K for operational support.
- Bidding for:
 - \$8,087 in 2025 CEP funding for Mesh-O radio control and tracking equipment.
 - \$32,380 in 2025 SOSP funding for a drone and lidar unit for mapping and operational support.
- Representing OACT at CEO forums held by ACT Sport & Recreation, to discuss the changing demographics and what makes a sport attractive for participants, and the challenges and opportunities for community based sports.
- Working with ACT Parks and Conservation Service (PCS) to compile a library of detailed maps showing the areas within the Canberra Nature Parks that are accessible for orienteering events. The availability of these maps has improved the access application approval process. OACT will continue to work with the ACT PCS to refine the maps and adjust if conditions change.
- Co-ordination of event planning and management; to offer a full and varied program of events for all levels. Taking into account the need to attract and retain newcomers, grow participations, improve finances, offer competitive challenges to the more experienced or elite orienteers, and not over-stretch our volunteer workforce.
- Representing OACT at workshops held by Orienteering Australia (OA) and providing input on a range of topics including budgeting and cost of OA's levies to be paid by the States, policies and plans, and initiatives such as improvements to Eventor and the OA website.
- Submitting applications to OA for Moira Whiteside (MW) Bequest funding. In 2024, OACT received \$7,000 as MW Bequest funding to support the 2024 Australian MTBO Championships, with funding used for promotion and initiatives to encourage participation.

OACT is dependent on the Clubs and Series Co-ordinators to conduct events. A special thanks to the Event Planning & Management Sub-Committee members and the Series Co-ordinators. Names of key people are listed at Annex C.

Our sport relies on volunteers to set courses, control and organise events. Our members continue to be the backbone of our sport, most contributing what they can when they can. To all the volunteers, OACT thanks you.

OACT would also like to acknowledge and thank the ACT Government Sport and Recreation Department for their continued financial and specialised administration support.

OACT also acknowledges the ongoing support of the Runners Shop, 76 Dundas Court Phillip through its sponsorship of the summer twilight series and through its discount scheme for members who purchase items from the Runners Shop.

Vale Bob Mouatt & Bob Allison

Sadly, OACT and Orienteering Australia lost two stalwarts of our sport with the passing of Bob Mouatt and Bob Allison.

Bob Mouatt

Bob was a true icon of our sport. He was a leader, promoter, communicator, manager, organiser, planner, controller, competitor, and mentor. Bob gave so much to our sport as a passionate member of Orienteering ACT and with Orienteering Australia.

Bob started orienteering in 1977 and was elected to the ACT Orienteering Association Board in 1986. He remained on the Board or Council for the next 11 years, holding the positions of Publicity Officer, Event Officer club representative. In 1997 he was appointed Executive Director for ACTOA/OACT, and held that position until 2004.

In February 1997 he was appointed by the Orienteering Federation of Australia as National Development Officer, then was elected Director (Development) in 2001 and President from 2006 to 2008. He continued as a voluntary media person for Orienteering Australia until 2011.

Bob's combined interests in media, sponsorship, event technology and general event organisation saw him take on key roles in several national and international events conducted by Orienteering ACT, including the 2000 World Cup races, the Australian Three-Days Carnivals in 2000, 2005, 2010 and 2016, and the 2007 and 2011 Oceania Championships.

Bob's personal efforts led to the receipt by Orienteering ACT of the ACT Chief Minister's Award for Excellence in the Sport and Recreation Industry in 1997 and 1998 and the Sport and Recreation Award for Marketing and Promotion in 2001. Bob's service to orienteering was recognised through his award of the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in the 2010 Australia Day Honours list and through induction as an Associate Member into the ACT Sport Hall of Fame in 2013. Bob was inducted into the Orienteering Australia Hall of Fame – General Division in 2018.



Bob Allison

Australian orienteering lost one of its most accomplished and popular participants with the passing of Bob Allison on 21 September, following a long illness. After being introduced to orienteering in Victoria in the mid-1970s through Yarra Valley Orienteers, Bob moved to Canberra with his family in late 1979, joining Canberra's Red Kangaroos club (now known as Red Roos).

The following decades saw Bob rise as a formidable masters-level competitor and contribute to the sport as a mapper, event organiser, course planner, controller and administrator at the local, national and international levels. His significant contribution to Australian orienteering was recognised through his induction into the General Division of the Orienteering Australia Hall of Fame. Bob served as the Public Officer for Orienteering Australia for many years.



2024 OACT Annual Awards

MIKE CASSELLS AWARD FOR SERVICES TO ORIENTEERING – Deirdre Sharkey & Mike Radajewski

Deirdre Sharkey and Mike Radajewski are nominated for the 2024 OACT Mike Cassells Award for Services to Orienteering.

Deirdre and Mike have contributed to orienteering in ACT through their leadership and contributions to a range of activities, primarily over the past 5 years. At the forefront of these activities is their management of the ACT Blue Lightning squad, in particular managing the fund raising and co-ordinating the work of other volunteers to support junior development. The outcome of the fund raising has been to reduce the cost for participants attending the Australian School Orienteering Championships and at the same time enhancing the social aspects and participants' experience at events through the cake stalls.

Deirdre and Mike are strong contributors to the organising and course setting events run by the Parawanga Club for OACT. Mike has recently attained accreditation as an event controller, furthering his contribution to OACT. When not organising the Blue Lightning fund raising or organising and course setting events, Deirdre and Mike are regular and competitive participants at events, locally, nationally and international.



SERVICES TO COACHING AWARD – David Stocks



David was the coach of the ACT ASOC team in 2024 and his effort and commitment was amazing. He was always positive, always inspiring team members to improve; at the same time he was not focused on individual results but was always focused on team members as people. Even the other states were somewhat jealous of our amazing coach. He was always available and prepared team members so that all were confidently and eagerly ready for all the events. The whole team were very lucky to have him as their coach.

JIM SAWKINS AWARD FOR EVENT MANAGEMENT –Mike Radajewski

Mike Radajewski is nominated for the 2024 OACT Jim Sawkins Award for Event Management as the co-ordinator for the OA National Junior Development Camp held in Canberra in December 2024.

This role required Mike to put together a team, which ended up to be 47 volunteers, to provide the coaching, organising and assisting over five days for 70 of Australia’s best and promising junior orienteers.

Despite the hot weather, the junior orienteers got to experience a variety of event types and locations from urban sprints in the Parliamentary Triangle, complex technical rock navigation in areas of Canberra Nature Parks, and venturing into Namadgi National Park for longer courses.

Mike oversaw the coaching and social programs, arranged accommodation, produced the budget and managed the finances. The camp was a tremendous success, achieved through the time and energy that Mike put into managing the camp.



Wehner Cup – The Orienteer of the Year Award for 2024

This is awarded to the person achieving the highest number of points in the ACT League competition. The winner for 2024 was Grace Crane, repeating her success from 2023.

Mapping Report

The past year has seen significant mapping activity and strategic planning by the newly formed OACT Foot-O Mapping Subcommittee. Efforts have focused on expanding the availability of high-quality maps for local and national events, improving the sustainability of mapping efforts, and preparing for the 2026 Oceania Championships.

Several mapping projects were completed over the past year, addressing both event requirements and long-term sustainability. These include:

- Googong Foreshores – Tate Needham: Used in a successful event in 2024 and subsequently extended, with new section yet to be used in competition. (\$1000 + \$500).
- McQuoid’s Hill – Jon Glanville: Used in a successful event in 2024. (Did not charge).
- Cooma (Stage 1) – Tate Needham and Hugh Moore: Scheduled for use in the 2025 ACT Middle Distance Championships. The remaining portion (final quarter) is expected to be completed within the next 12 months. (\$1770 + travel expenses to Tate, \$3745 to Hugh).
- Botanic Gardens – Paul de Jongh: Used in the recent ACT Sprint Championships. (\$1000).
- Radford College Update – David Stocks: To be scheduled into the 2026 NOL season. (\$600, \$300 coming from Radford College)
- Metro Areas – Martin Wehner: Stromlo Observatory, Narrabundah Hill, Fadden Pines, and Black Mountain Peninsula have been mapped or significantly updated to maintain reasonable standard. (Did not charge).

In addition to the above completed projects, exploration has been conducted into new mapping opportunities. Investigations have been conducted into the feasibility of mapping the following areas, among others:

- Bogong Creek
- Corin Forest
- Pierces Creek
- East Bombay
- Bullen Range
- Tuggeranong Pines

These areas are being assessed for terrain suitability, accessibility, and long-term event potential.

OACT has received in-principal approval for funding to acquire a mapping drone, which will be managed by the Mapping Subcommittee. This tool, along with the anticipated release of new LIDAR data in June 2025, is expected to improve mapping efficiency, reduce costs, and enhance the accuracy of new and updated maps.

Looking ahead, the Mapping Subcommittee aims to deliver at least one new ACT League map and one new Metro League map in the upcoming calendar year. Preparations are also underway for mapping requirements tied to the 2026 Oceania Championships. The following mapping projects are prioritized:

Oceania Carnival:

- Bogong Creek (Mapper: Tate Needham)
- Stromlo Forest Park (Mapper: Martin Wehner)
- Honeysuckle Creek (Mapper: TBC)
- Pine Island (Mapper: Jon Glanville)
- Ainslie (Mappers: John Shelton-Agar, Rohan Hyslop)

Other:

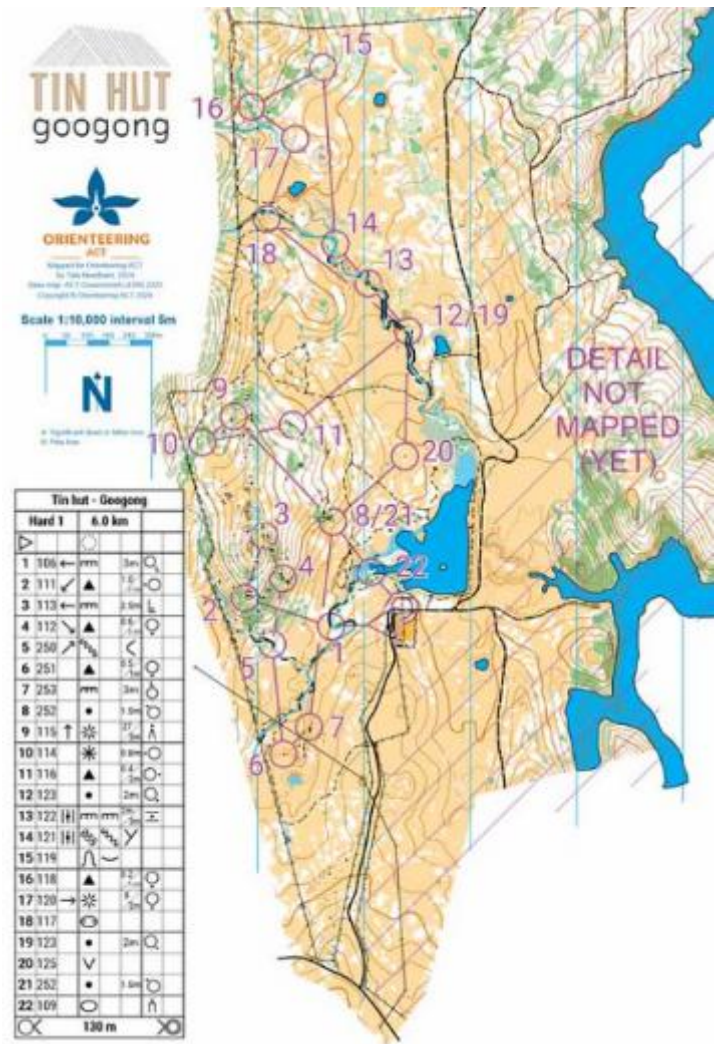
- Pierces Creek (Mapper: Hugh Moore)
- Molonglo Pines (Mapper: Paul de Jongh)
- Mt Painter (Mapper: David Stocks)
- University of Canberra (Mapper: TBC)

Mapping efforts continue to be shaped by a range of external factors, including:

- Land access permissions: Negotiating with ACT Parks and private landholders remains an ongoing task.
- Vegetation and terrain changes: Bushfire regrowth and seasonal shifts impact map viability.
- Availability of skilled mappers: Recruiting and training new mappers remains a high priority to ensure long-term sustainability.

OACT will continue to invest in training younger members, leveraging new technologies, and maintaining strong relationships with land management authorities.

The OACT Mapping Subcommittee has made substantial progress since its conception last year. With strategic planning, OACT remains well-positioned to deliver high quality maps, particularly in preparation for the 2026 Oceania Championships. The Mapping Subcommittee extends its gratitude to all those who have contributed to this year's mapping efforts and looks forward to another productive year ahead.



Coaching & Development

SC-ORE - Autumn and Spring SC-ORE 2024 went ahead. The numbers were not up to Pre-COVID numbers, but enough to successfully run the series. Ideally there would be around 150 children participating, with a maximum of 200.

Autumn SC-ORE had a deliberate break of a week due to Easter, with the last event being in April. That turned out to work well, and the change from Daylight Saving helped avoid having to set up in the dark. The third event was held in a public park, Eddison Park rather than in a school. This reduced the workload on the organizer, due to easier access and less coordination: The park is always open, while many schools are now enclosed with fences, which limits the access times to the school grounds for map updates and course setting and requires co-ordination with the schools. Autumn SC-ORE had 58 participants and 15 teams, made up of 37 girls and 21 boys. Venues used were; Hughes Primary School, Curtin Primary School, Eddison Park and Forrest Primary School.

Spring SC-ORE only had 47 entries a few days before the communicated entry closure, one week before the event. This, despite an early start to the advertisement followed by regular reminders. Some schools ran the advertisement in their Newsletters, but we suspect many did not. For SC-ORE the School's Newsletter is the most efficient way to attract participants. Due to the few entries a decision was made to postpone the series by two weeks and combine the delay with social media advertisement. A questionnaire



at the end of the series confirmed that the most common way to heard about SC-ORE is through the school's Newsletter followed by hearing about it from a friend or word of mouth. Only one person said that they had seen the advertisement on social media. The delayed start and efforts to get more participants paid off, and at the end there were 94 participants and 23 teams, made up of 54 girls and 40 boys. Venues used were; Rosary Primary School, Lyneham Primary School, St Joseph's Primary School and Ainslie School (Braddon).

As always, orienteering events are not possible without volunteers, and SC-ORE is no exception. A big thank you to all SC-ORE volunteers, School staff and to Paul de Jongh for excellent support and admin in and from the office. Regular

volunteers were; Bill Jones, Ken Mansell, Bryant Allen, Valerie Barker, Stephen Goggs, Cath Chalmers, Chris Stocks, David Stocks, Frank Ingwersen, Max Walter and Aoife Rothery.

Learn to Orienteer (L2O) – Following the success of the Learn an Orienteer program in 2023, OACT ran another two programs in 2024 - one in winter and one in spring/summer. The ages of the participants span all ages from young children and parents to teenagers and adults. Some want to learn about and explore orienteering as a sport, others are more interested in learning the basic navigation skills for other reasons; (how to read a map and how to use a compass for navigation).

The program was purposely run in parallel with regular orienteering events (ACT Metro and Twilight series). This gave the participants the opportunity to try out orienteering and practice their newly learnt skills on their own there and then. Many took this opportunity during the program. The last session, graduation, included getting around a regular course. After the program, some of the participants continued attending regular events.

Advertisement for the program was through the normal website - under “news” and as distinct programs in the event calendar – and through targeted Facebook adds. The latter was the most common way for the participants to find out about the program, otherwise through own web search or recommendations from friends.

Participants:

- There were 31 people registered for Autumn/Winter LTO; made up of 4 Sub-Junior Females, 4 Sub-Junior Males, 2 Junior Males, 1 Senior Male, 7 Masters Male & 13 Masters Females. Eight additional parents were also involved.
- There were 21 people registered for Spring LTO; made up of 2 Sub-Junior Females, 5 Sub-Junior Males, 2 Junior Females, 2 Senior Males, 2 Senior Females, 3 Masters Male & 5 Masters Females. Five additional parents were also involved.

In 2025, the plan is to continue the Learn to Orienteering programs in conjunction with ACT Metro series in Winter and the Twilight series in Spring/Summer., as well as offering shorter options at different geographical areas with the aim to reach new groups.

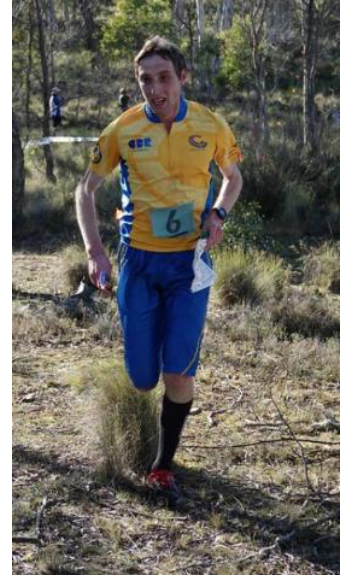

Australian Junior Development Camp

OACT hosted the 2024 Australian Junior Development Camp (AJDC) held over five days in mid December. The Camp attracted 69 of Australia's most promising junior orienteers from all over Australia, supported by 47 coaches, guest lecturers, organisers and helpers. Despite the hot weather, the junior orienteers got to experience a variety of event types and locations from urban sprints in the Parliamentary Triangle, complex technical rock navigation in areas of Canberra Nature Parks, and venturing into Namadgi National Park for longer courses.

Australian Mountain Bike Orienteering (MTBO) Carnival

OACT hosted the 2024 Australian MTBO Carnival from 17-20 October, which was the largest event of its type ever held in Australia.

It took 12 months of preparation, required a Team of 60 tireless skilled and committed Orienteering ACT volunteers to deliver 5 quality events over 4 days across 5 different locations. The Carnival attracted 213 individual participants, including 41 from New Zealand MTBO and 2 from the UK MTBO riders, ranging in age from 12 to 80, competing in 4 formats; Spring, Middle, Long and Mass Start.

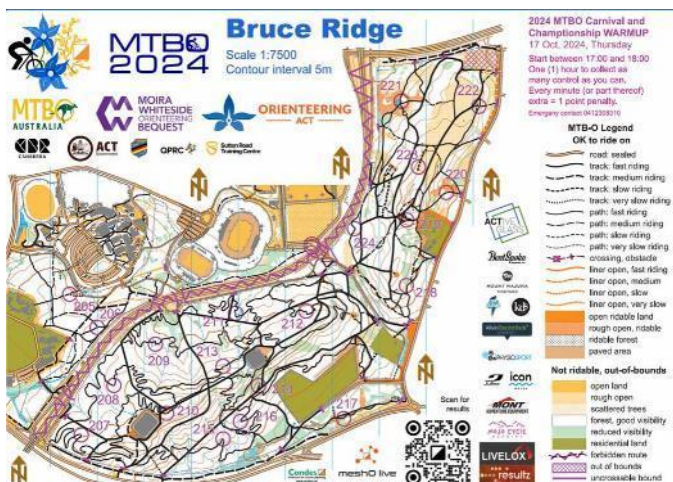
The Australia-New Zealand Challenge was held during the competition with NZ narrowly winning 18 points to 17.

Overall, the events were very successful, developing a strong team of capable MTBO organisers and course setters/controllers, aided by expertise through IOF Advisor workshops. The aim for 2025 is to build on the success of the Championships to grow the sport in the ACT, with more participants and a wider pool of volunteers skilled to run MTBO events.



Mountain Bike Orienteering

The OACT MTBO Team arranged 11 events in 2024, including the 5 events for the Australian MTBO Carnival. Total participation for 2024 was 1069, made up of 801 for the Carnival and 268 for local events and Come-and-Try days.

One new MTBO map was produced (Stringybark Hill) and 5 maps were updated; (Green Hills, Bruce Ridge, West Stromlo, Sutton Road, Kowen Homestead and Gossan Hill).

In total 14 OACT people worked on setter or controlling MTBO courses in 2024. Details are below:

Main Priorities for Future Development of MTBO in ACT for 2025 – 2026

1. To bring more Juniors (12-20) to the sport
2. To continue increasing number of MTBO Course Setters/Controllers (2-3 new people per year)
3. To continue increasing number of MTBO maps (1-2 new maps per year, 20 MTBO maps in ACT by 2026).
4. To increase number of MTBO events per year from 8 in 2025 to 9-10 in 2026.

5. To increase number of female athletes in the sport by 2025.
6. To reach a stable number of 50-60 MTBO participants per event by 2026 with 10 regular events per year.
7. Start of development of succession planning: Marina has been coordinating MTBO since 2017 in Canberra, so the plan is to prepare a new skilled MTBO Coordinator by 2027-2030, so any long-term EoI is welcomed.

Ski Orienteering

The 2024 ACT/NSW Ski Orienteering Championships were held in August at Perisher attracting 39 participants; 21 of whom are not regular orienteers. The event was co-ordinated by Marina Iskhakova, supported by Fedor Iskhakov and course setter, Sam Wilson.

Full coverage of the event was published in the December 2024 Australian Orienteer magazine, promoting the sport to the orienteering community.

The 2025 Ski-O event will once again be held at Perisher, with the date set as 10th August.

The Ski-O team is keen to continue holding this once a year event, however it is challenging given the uncertainty of snow conditions and the cost to participants for travel and accommodation.

Street Orienteering – John Harding

A record total of 47 street orienteering events were conducted in 2024, the same as in 2023 and 2022 but an increase on the 40 in 2021 and 26 in covid-lockdown affected 2020. All were smartphone/smartwatch MapRun score events to maximise covid safety and reduce organiser workload; a small number of orienteers without MapRun-compliant phones were still able to participate using an honesty system to visit controls and self report their results. Lawrie Brown contributed greatly to publishing the MapRun courses and processing the combined MapRun and self-reported results for upload to the national results database on Eventor.



There were 2,345 participations from the 47 events, representing 23.7% of the total participations at OACT events in 2024. This represented a small decline on the 2,439 participations in 2023 and 2,649 in 2022, in part due to the popularity of OACT's summer-period Sunday Sprint Series and Short Series.

To keep the street orienteering program refreshed, fun new maps with shorter courses were used by course setter John Harding at Hall Village, North Lyneham, Wright and the Kingston Foreshore and new maps were also produced for events at McKellar (Pat Miethke), Evatt (Nikolaus Elz), Higgins (Arthur Watson), Ngunnawal (Jennifer Webb) and Dunlop Ponds (John Harding).

Most suitable Canberra suburbs now have Street O maps and provide a year-round schedule of events; a Thursday to Monday start time window was used for each event to maximise both participation and covid-safety, with beginners and orienteers seeking social engagement encouraged to participate on Monday afternoons during a 5pm to 6.15pm start window. A Street O newsletter is produced after nearly every event to encourage participation, both in Street O but also in other OACT events. With the high ACT usage of MapRun, OACT contributed \$1300 to the running costs of the national MapRun database.

Annex B – Achievement against OACT Strategic Plan 2021-2024

STRATEGY 1:

Make it more attractive to participate

Our participants range in age from under 10 to late 80s, and include world champions, club members, school groups and families. We want it to be more attractive for people to start and to continue all forms of orienteering.

Strategic Initiatives

1.1	Increase the attractiveness of orienteering to new and current participants and club members, through offering a diverse and innovative program of events, including through the use of emerging technologies.	
1.2	Increase youth involvement in orienteering, including by continuing to support the Sporting Schools program and junior development pathways.	
1.3	Make orienteering more time and cost effective for participants and organisers through simplified administrative process and event management.	
1.4	Continue to encourage and acknowledge volunteering in orienteering and aim to increase the number of participants volunteering to support orienteering.	

1.4 OACT has a shrinking volunteer workforce for most of the key roles, which is the reason for the Amber rating. There doesn’t seem to be a shortage of volunteers to do the on-the-day event roles, but when it comes to Coaching, Mapping and Controlling major events the onus tends to fall to a small group of experienced volunteers to do most of the work.

STRATEGY 2:

Organise events more efficiently

Our events range from permanent courses, virtual courses and inter-club events, to major state and national events. Our events are run by volunteers and we want to make it easier for them to organise great events.

Strategic Initiatives

2.1	Encourage and reward our workforce: volunteers, paid officials, and those who innovate to improve our events, event software and resource material.	
2.2	Improve access to and information available about suitable terrain, maps, environment and risk management, and approvals required by landowners, including ACT Government for Public Use Land Access.	
2.3	Maintain technical standards for events and—through training, mentoring, event controller accreditations and maintaining up-to-date reference material—improve our workforce’s capability and capacity to meet them.	
2.4	Increase the numbers and quality of accredited coaches, course setters and controllers.	
2.5	Seek opportunities to collaborate with other associations, especially Orienteering NSW, in the running of events in the region.	

2.3/2.4 Orienteering is a highly rules bound sport and daunting for less experienced orienteers to step up to course setting and organising. Both of which are requirements to move on to become a controller. Some progress was made in 2023 to increase the number of accredited controllers and coaches and to mentor new course setters. 2024 saw several first time course setters and a handful of controllers being accredited or updating their accreditation. The number of accredited coaches remained steady, but below what is ideally required.

STRATEGY 3:

Streamline our administration

Orienteering is administered at three levels (club, state and national), mostly by volunteers. We want to ease their workload by streamlining our administrative processes.

Strategic Initiatives

3.1	Maintain a high level of governance and regulatory compliance, including through appropriate consistency with the governance arrangements of Orienteering Australia.	
3.2	Support a safe and inclusive sport and strive for a balance of ability, gender and experience across all levels of orienteering participation and administration.	
3.3	Have the best information available, supported by improved ICT systems, for the management of our sport, including by improving membership and participation data and reporting.	
3.4	Engage with Orienteering Australia and the other State Associations to develop a unified approach to event and resource administration.	
3.5	Ensure our sport is financially sustainable and financially attractive for participants to attend events and take up memberships.	At Risk

3.5 This initiative was rated Red at the end of 2023. The financial position has improved slightly but remains at risk due to increasing expenses and the drop in participation numbers compared to pre-COVID years, although it appears that the decline in participation numbers has stabilised to a new post COVID norm. OACT remains dependent on financial support from ACT Government and any changes in the grant structure could impact adversely OACT’s financial position.

STRATEGY 4:

Communicate effectively

New participants, current members and stakeholders need relevant and timely communication about orienteering. We want to listen, collaborate and communicate to those within and those outside our orienteering community.

Strategic Initiatives

4.1	Maintain a web presence, regular e-bulletins, social media and connections with mainstream media.	
4.2	Consolidate document management and make materials accessible to participants, event organisers and administrators.	
4.3	Use our communications infrastructure effectively to communicate with our members, interested parties and stakeholders, including ACT Government and media.	
4.4	Look for opportunities to better promote our sport, especially to school age children and families.	
4.5	Support Orienteering Australia's communication to members and interested parties.	

4.4 Promotion has continued to occur but has tended to be piecemeal with insufficient priorities of what we need to promote, how, when, where, who and costs involved. Similar to the situation at the end of 2023, we haven't evaluated fully the effectiveness of our promotion – are we preaching to the current OACT population, are we promoting to seek broader community general awareness or is it targeted to get active engagement.

STRATEGY 5:

Perform at our best

Our participants range from novices to aspiring champions in a range of orienteering disciplines and age classes. We want every orienteer to realise their potential, regardless of their age, ability or chosen form of orienteering.

Strategic Initiatives

5.1	Maintain strong programs to support ACT teams and squads.	
5.2	Encourage every orienteer to enjoy improving their performance through a strong coaching infrastructure, training and providing high quality events.	

5.2 OACT is unlike other States. Other States have active Clubs, where the Clubs do provide coaching for their members. Meaning services like coaching tend to be seen by our Clubs and members as an OACT responsibility. It may not be possible for all Clubs to achieve, but encouraging the larger Clubs to have a social and coaching program could bring coaching closer to the people.

Orienteering ACT (OACT) provides for the following types of members for which different fees apply. The fees for 2024 were: Adult Member \$65 pa and Junior Member \$10 pa. Juniors born 2012 and later have free membership. Life Members are granted membership at zero cost.

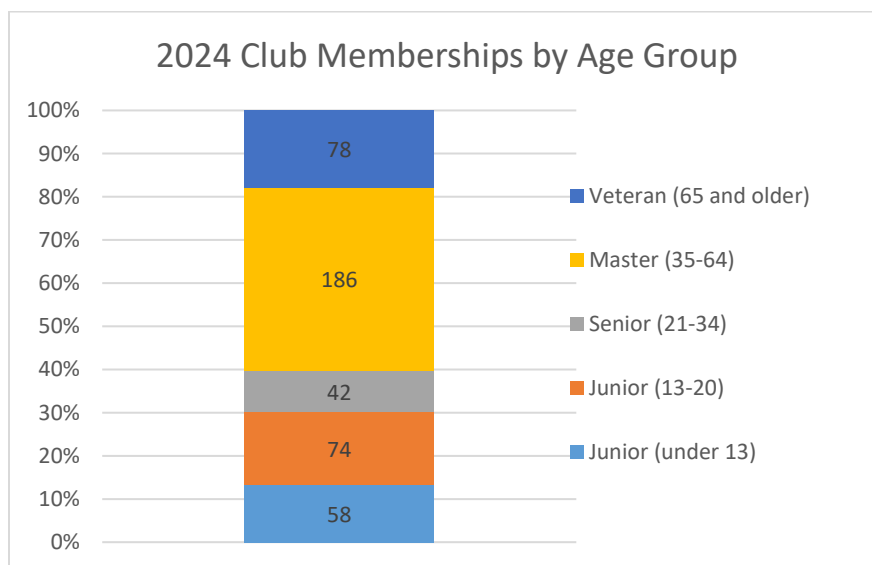
Casuals (CAS-A) are event participants, who register their details with OACT, creating a login to the corporate database but don't join a club.

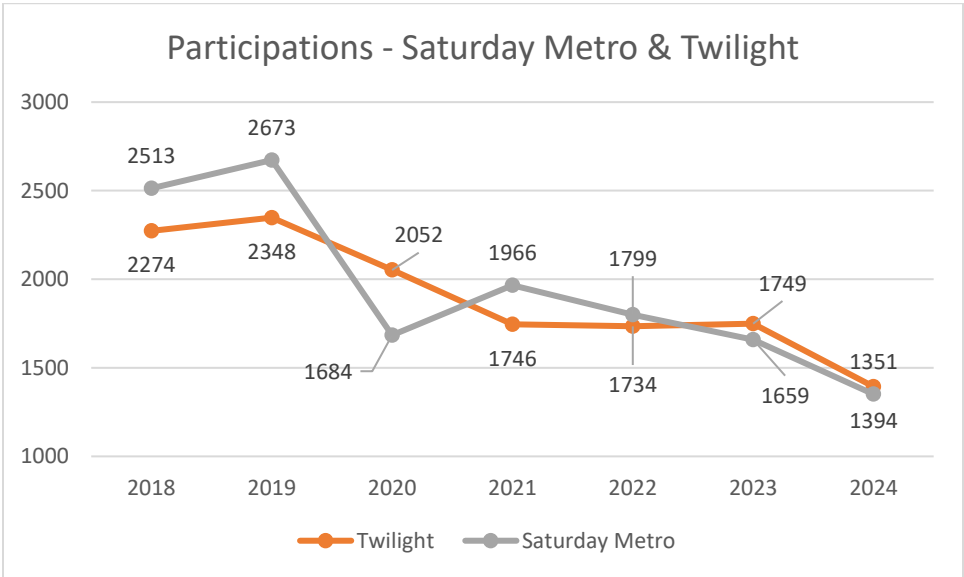
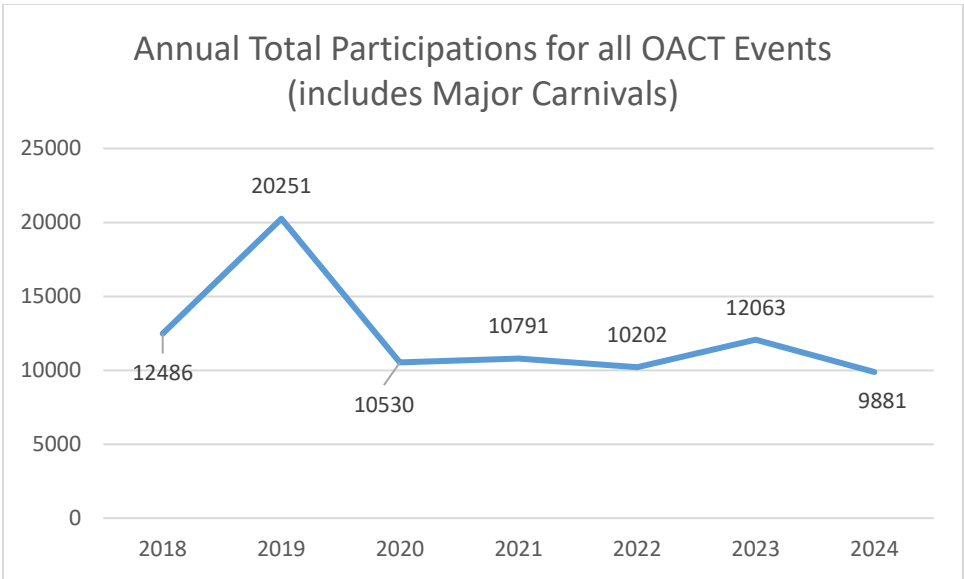
2024 saw a slight drop in participations at the Saturday Metro and Wednesday Twilight events, with most other formats having participation numbers similar to 2023.

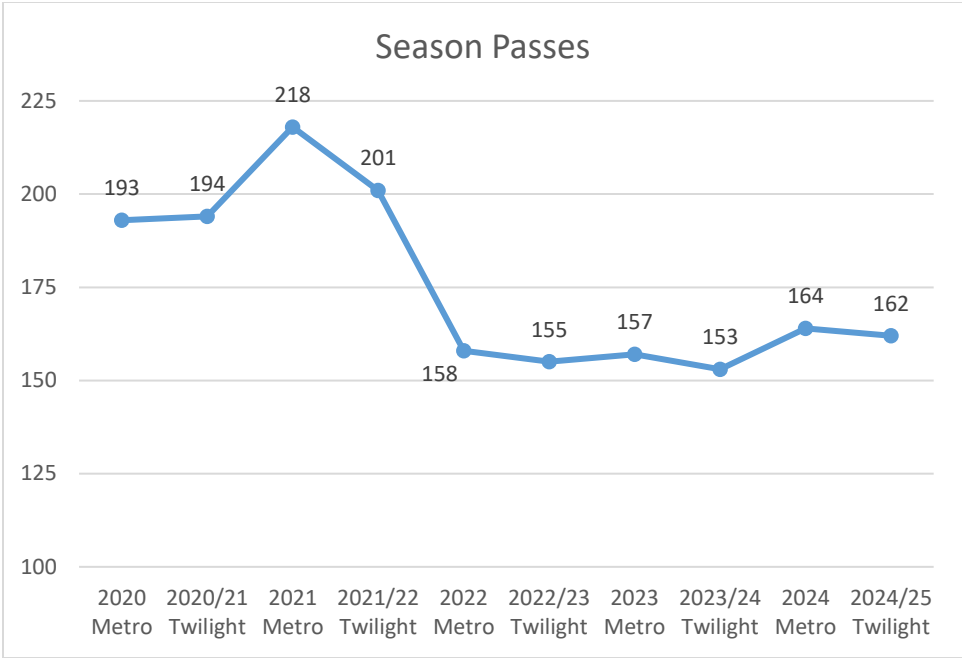

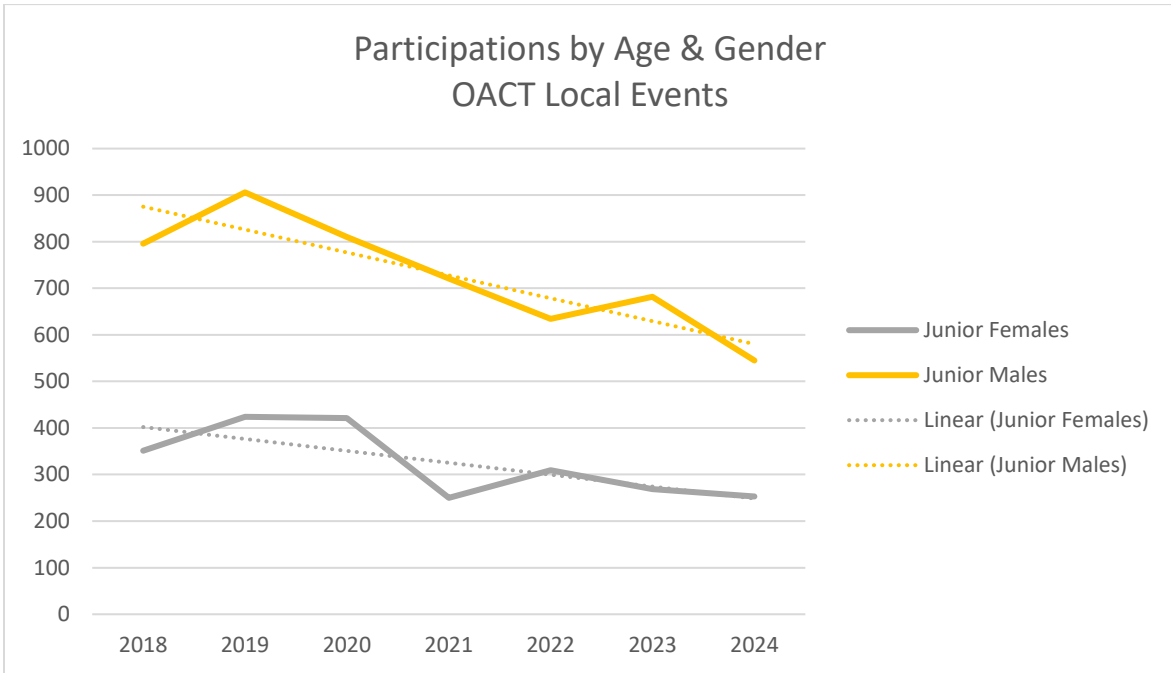
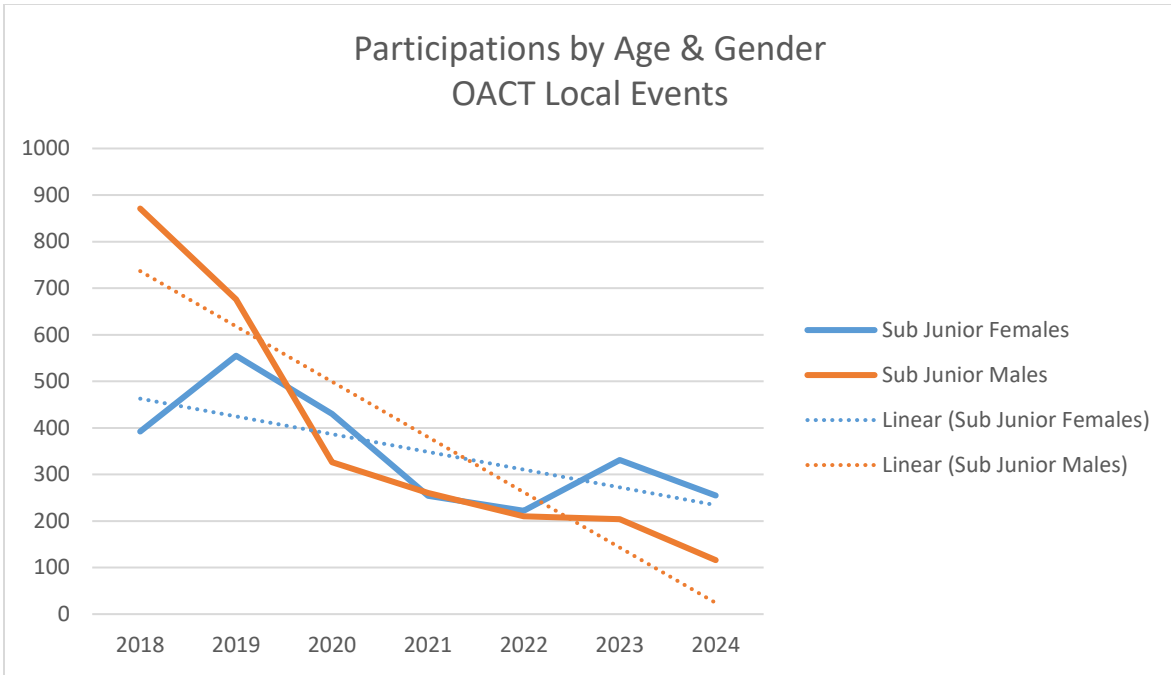
The data on participations by Gender and Age came from 9881 participations where Gender and Age were recorded. There were 1417 participations where Age and/or Gender were not recorded. These are typically events such as Street-O, Come-and-Try events.

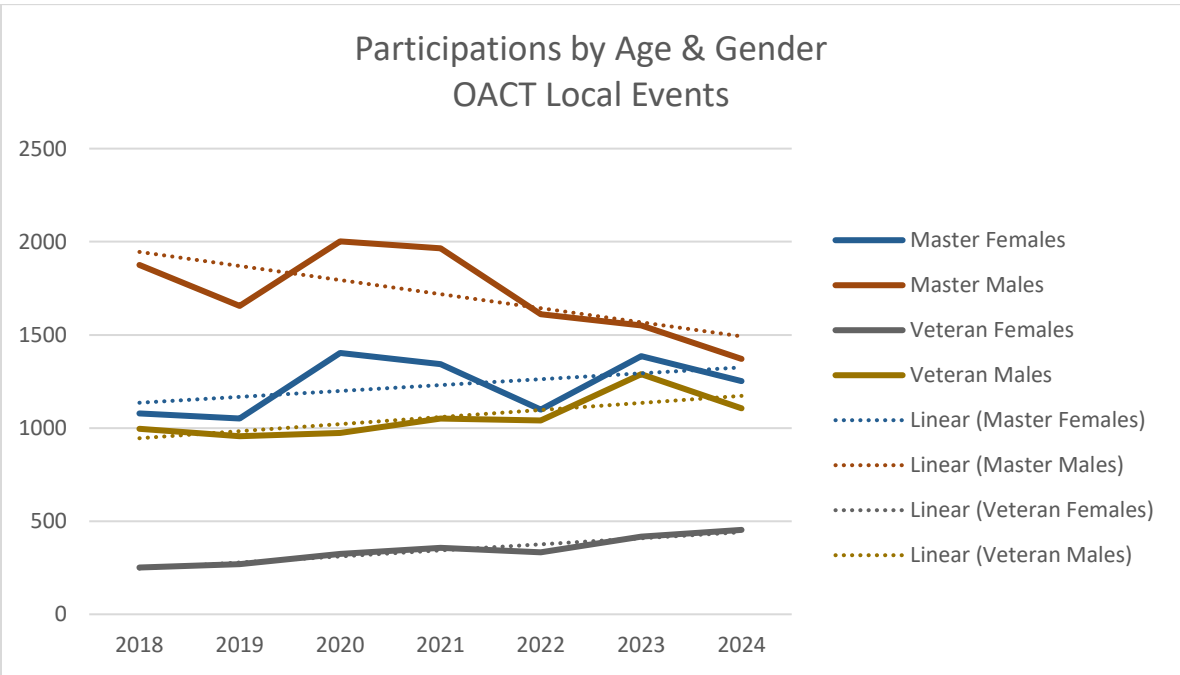
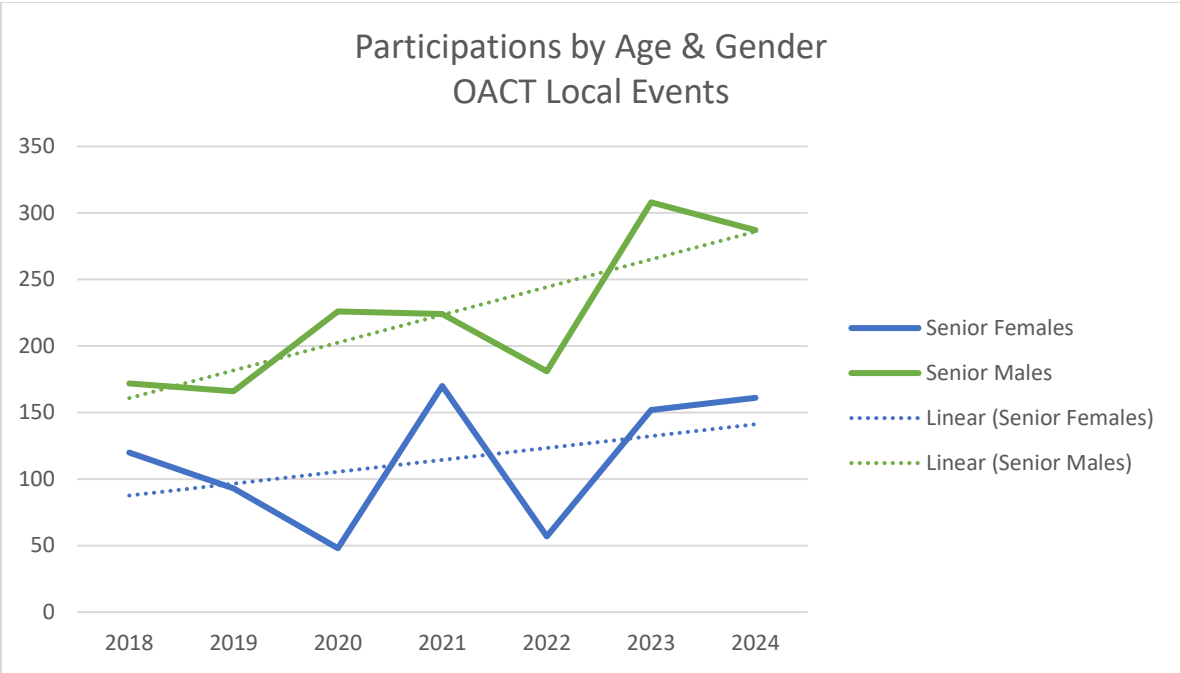
There were 1436 unique entries for events in 2024. This is not the same as unique participants because entries include teams where some team members may also be individual entrants for other events.

Of the 1436 unique entrants, 545 did 5 or more events. This is similar to the figure from 2023, when 523 unique entrants did 5 or more events. It can be surmised that OACT had about 545 regular orienteers. The other 900 entrants were made up of interstate orienteers attending the Oceania MTBO Championships, the National Orienteering League and the NSW State League events conducted by OACT, plus casual orienteers who attended infrequently.

264 participants attended 10 or more events; 134 attended 20 or more events; 70 attended 30 or more events; and 36 attended 40 or more events.

The following graphs show the age and gender for participations at OACT local events from 2028-2024. Local events do not include Championship or National Orienteering League events. The trendlines show an increase in participations in the Seniors, Masters and Veteran age groups; with decreases in Sub-Junior (<13) and Junior (13-20) age classes.

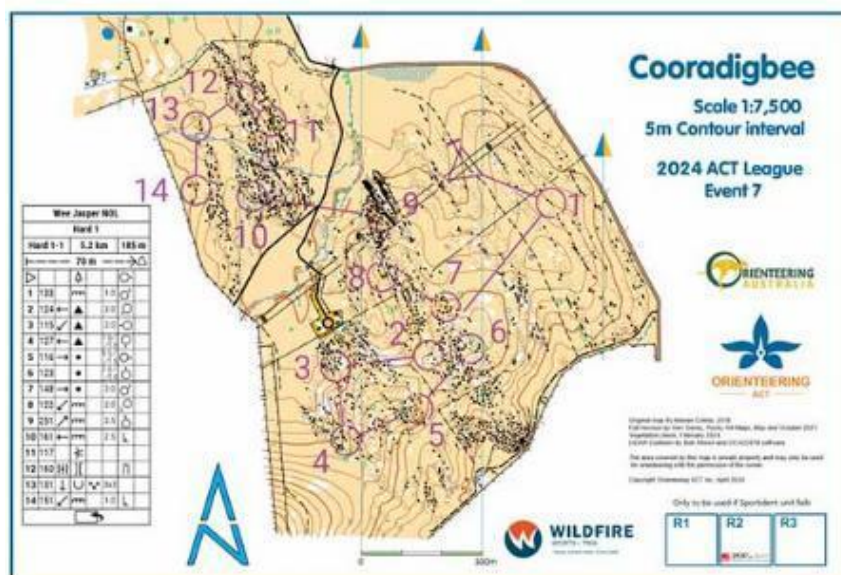
