President's Report – Nina Davis

We have wrapped up another year of training and competing around the world, across Australia and on Ngunnawal Country at home. Here are a few highlights for Orienteering ACT (OACT) in 2025.

ACT had strong representation in Australia's teams for major international events in 2025. A huge congratulations to all selected athletes! At the **World Orienteering Championships** in Finland: Grace Crane (Abominable O-Men), Justine Hobson (Bushflyers) and Caitlin Young (Bushflyers). David Stocks (Bushflyers) was also selected as a reserve. At the **Junior World Orienteering Championships** in Italy: Elye Dent (Red Roos) and Owen Radajewski (Parawanga). Ariadna Iskhakova (Red Roos) was a reserve. For the **European Youth Orienteering Championships** in Czechia: Hayden Dent (Red Roos), Elye Dent (Red Roos) and Ariadna Iskhakova (Red Roos). Aoife Rothery (Red Roos) was a reserve.

On the home front, our juniors dominated, with our ACT team convincingly winning the **Australian Schools Orienteering Championships** (over TAS and NSW who have wielded it for the past 6 years!) in Brisbane. They also became the only Australian team *ever* to get their name etched on the Southern Cross Junior Challenge Trophy (in a tie with NZ Harua).

At the **Australian Orienteering Championships** in Brisbane, our Canberra Cockatoos concluded their **National Orienteering League** competition and took out the win in the W21 class.

OACT ran 132 events in 2025, more than recent years, although overall participation numbers remained steady.

A major highlight was the **ACT Sprint Championships** held at the Australian National Botanic Gardens—a dream location that finally came to fruition. Our **ACT Middle Championships** took us to Pine Range in Cooma, treating competitors to highly challenging, premium new terrain as part of a great double-header weekend with the **ACT Long Championships** out at Highlands near Nimmitabel.

Our mapping footprint grew significantly this year thanks to dedicated mappers and good relationships with ACT Parks and local schools that allowed us access. Many new sprint maps debuted in our **Winter Sprint Series**: Fern Hill Park, Lennox Gardens, Swinger Hill, Kingston Wasteland, Collins Park and Giralang Pines. The start of the **Summer Sprint Series** also saw some new maps: Marist College, Telopea Park School and Queanbeyan High School. **Forest map extensions** included Googong Tin Hut, Pine Range and a complete remap of Narrabundah Hill. New and updated **MTBO** maps were also produced for the National Arboretum, Kowen Forest and Cotter Pines.

Behind the scenes, the Board works to ensure OACT remains sustainable and forward-looking. Financially, OACT is in a stable position, aided by the several grants including through the **ACT Government's Club Enhancement Program**. An operational success in 2025 was the rollout of our **digital enter-on-the-day system** for most local-level events, enabling both new and returning orienteers to enter without putting extra burden on volunteers. In governance, the Board formally endorsed the **2025–2030 OACT Strategic Plan** in March and conducted its first annual review of progress against the plan in October. The Board also focused on succession planning and volunteer load for 2026, particularly with the upcoming Oceania Championships.

Orienteering Australia (OA) continues to develop resources and programs targeted at new orienteers. A shout out to Susanne Harrysson for taking charge of the new **Learn to Orienteer** (L2O) program in 2025 and making full use of the 5 L2O grants from OA. **Discover Orienteering** is another new initiative from OA, and David Stocks led a very successful trial here in the ACT ahead of the initiative's full rollout across the country.

Most importantly, I want to acknowledge our incredible **volunteers**. Delivering 132 events is no mean feat. We are highly aware of the risk of volunteer fatigue, and moving forward, the Board has a firm focus on ensuring the quality of our events over the quantity.

As we look to 2026, we will be prioritising the sustainability of our local programming, nurturing the continued success of our junior squads, and hopefully firmly establishing the L2O program. Most notably, resources will be focused on delivering a smooth and successful Oceania Championships.

Thank you to our repeat volunteers, the Board and every member who ran, rode, skied or helped out in 2025, and happy 50th birthday to OACT's first club, Parawanga! Here's to an exciting and sustainable 2026.

Governance

The OACT Board held eight meetings in 2025: 3 February, 24 March, 28 April, 26 May, 30 June, 25 August, 13 October and 24 November. The outcomes of the meetings were published as news articles on the OACT website.

The Event Planning & Management Sub-Committee met twice in 2025 to develop the program of events for the second half of 2025 and for events to be held in 2026.

One of the long-term clubs, Weston Emus (WE-A) was closed due to declining numbers, with the remaining continuing members opting to join one of the other four clubs.

OACT Strategic Plan 2025–2030

This section of the Annual Report summarises the [OACT Strategic Plan 2025-2030](#) and ACT's achievements against that Plan. The Plan has four overarching strategies with initiatives listed in two year slices. The strategic objectives are:

1. Participation and Community Growth
2. Volunteer Development and Event Excellence
3. Financial and Organisational Sustainability
4. Innovation and Awareness

2025 is the first year of the first two year cycle. Overall, OACT has achieved or is well on track to achieve all the initiatives listed for the first two year cycle. Details of progress as at end 2025 for achieving the strategic Initiatives are provided at Annex B.

Financial Summary

The 2025 audited Financial Reports are at Annex A. In summary;

- As at 31st December 2025; OACT's total current assets were \$288,852, current Liabilities of \$57,008 giving net assets of **\$226,886**.
- OACT's overall profit and loss for 2025 was a loss of **\$41,874**. The reason for the loss was a write-down of \$48,358 for equipment assets. This was a decision taken at the OACT AGM held in April 2025, to better reflect the value of long held equipment.
- When not taking in account the write-down of equipment assets, OACT had a surplus of **\$6,484**, which was similar to the 2024 surplus of \$7,914.
- Prior to 2024, the previous year with a surplus was 2019, (pre-COVID).

The Auditor assessed that the Financial Report presents fairly, in all material aspects, the financial position of Orienteering ACT incorporated as at 31st December 2025.

OACT's financial position is sound, with the forecast of a surplus in 2026 when OACT hosts a round of the National Orienteering League and the Oceania Championships.

Executive Officer's Report - Phil Walker

The main stakeholder and governance issues dealt with in 2025 were:

- Bidding for and being awarded ACT Government Sporting & Recreation (S&R) grants:
 - \$16,706 for the OACT High Performance (Cockatoos) program for season 2025/26.
 - \$8,000 for the 2025 Club Enhancement Program (CEP) for the purchase of Mesh-O radio units.
 - \$32,380 for the 2025 State Organisation Support Program (SOSP), made up of \$22,380 for purchase of a drone and LIDAR unit, and \$10K for operational support.
- Bidding for and being awarded an ACT Government Event grant:
 - \$7,500 for Oceania Championships for hire of temporary equipment
- Bidding for 2026 ACT Government (S&R) grants:
 - \$1,600 in CEP funding for 100 new control flags.
 - \$17,600 in SOSP funding, made up of \$7,600 for Remote First Aid training and \$10,000 for operational support.
 - Decisions on the 2026 grant applications are not yet known.
- Assisting with applications to Orienteering Australia (OA) for Moira Whiteside (MW) Bequest funding:
 - \$20,000 for support to Oceania Championships. \$14,000 paid in 2025 with remainder of funding to be provided after the Championships.
 - \$18,404 to supplement funding obtained from ACT Government for purchase of a drone and LIDAR unit.
- Representing OACT at CEO forums held by ACT Sport & Recreation, to discuss the changing demographics and what makes a sport attractive for participants, and the challenges and opportunities for community-based sports.
- Working with ACT Parks and Conservation Service (PCS) for continued access to Canberra Reserves and Nature Parks. 2025 was a 'steady-as-you-go' year with no issues impacting the availability of permitted locations for events.
- Development of the OACT Strategic Plan 2025-2030
- Co-ordination of event planning and management; to offer a full and varied program of events for all levels. Taking into account the need to attract and retain newcomers, grow participations, improve finances, offer competitive challenges to the more experienced or elite orienteers, and not over-stretch our volunteer workforce. OACT is dependent on the Clubs and Series Co-ordinators to conduct events. A special thanks to the Event Planning & Management Sub-Committee members and the Series Co-ordinators. Names of key people are listed at Annex C.
- Published a guide on 'Where do my entry fees go' in response to a handful of questions from participants on the increase in cost for event entries.

2025 was a successful year: Membership numbers were the highest they have been since pre-COVID. Participation numbers are slightly down on previous years due to OACT not hosting a major Carnival in 2025. However, if participation numbers for Carnivals are not considered, the participation in 2025 is on par with the previous post COVID years. OACT offers a wide range of event types, with several types showing strong participation whereas there has been a fall-off in attendance at a couple of the other types of events. Details on memberships, events and participations are provided at Annex C.

OACT acknowledges and thanks the ACT Government Sport and Recreation Department for their continued financial and specialised administration support.

OACT also acknowledges the ongoing support of the Runners Shop, 76 Dundas Court Phillip through its sponsorship of the summer twilight series and through its discount scheme for members who purchase items from the Runners Shop.

2025 OACT Annual Awards

MIKE CASSELLS AWARD FOR SERVICES TO ORIENTEERING – Susanne Harryson

As the OACT President from April 2022 to April 2025 Susanne was prominent in promoting orienteering and strengthening OACT's governance. This was at a time when all community sports were needing to rebuild their membership and participation base after the COVID years, and at time when the Australia Sports Commission, Orienteering Australia and State Governments were raising the standards on what was required from sporting organisations to meet best practice for governance. As a result of Susanne's leadership, OACT achieved the higher governance standards and, although it took longer than expected, OACT's membership and participation numbers have increased getting closer to pre-COVID levels.

Susanne has been, and still is, the driving force behind the very successful Learn-to-Orienteering (L2O) programs. She has worked with Orienteering Australia to shape the L2O syllabus and has been the co-ordinator for running the L2O programs for OACT since inception. The value of the L2O program can be seen in the number of newcomers to the sport for both adults and juniors.

Susanne has also been the driving force behind the resurgence in the SC-ORE series of orienteering for the younger school students. She manages the series, liaises with schools for access to venues and promotes the sport. This is no simple task, having become more difficult to engage with schools post COVID, with many schools reluctant to have events or promote internally. Nevertheless, the Spring 2025 SC-ORE series was the best attended series since before COVID.

When not managing the L2O and SC-ORE programs, Susanne co-ordinates the Sprint series, once again liaising with schools for access to venues on Sunday mornings and arranging for course setters, with Susanne invariably the person on the computer/registration desk. When time permits she also helps out with pre-event coaching.

Susanne doesn't seek recognition or self-promotion. She just gets on and does what is required, which means much of what she does to promote the sport, run series of events and coaching goes unnoticed for most participants.

It is of no surprise, given this impressive list of achievements, that Susanne was nominated for this award by at least five separate OACT members. Every one of these spoke very highly of the enormous commitment and breadth of contributions made by her to OACT in the promotion of orienteering, and the enhancement of its reach across the ACT.

Well done, Susanne. You are a deserving winner of the award and OACT thanks you for all that you have achieved.



SERVICES TO COACHING AWARD – Stephen Goggs

Since 2017 Stephen has been the OACT Sporting Schools coordinator, administering and delivering programs to primary and secondary school students across Canberra and the nearby NSW region.

The program has been rolled out in one form or another to over 70 primary schools and 20 high schools and colleges, many of them happy repeat customers. Stephen makes proactive contact with school sports teachers throughout the ACT reminding them of the opportunities available to seek funding for orienteering coaching. When grants are announced he follows up with teachers who have logged an expression of interest in applying their funds to orienteering in order to identify suitable dates and times to deliver the coaching program. Stephen has developed a passion for delivering the coaching himself on many occasions, but he has also developed a cohort of other retirees and, increasingly, university student coaches to assist with the task, especially when schools book in up to eight classes per day for each of the four days of a typical program.



Stephen has also been OACT's representative on a number of OA-led national working parties and has contributed heavily to the development of a successful and respected Coaching Curriculum for orienteering and a Program Delivery Guide aligned to the learning outcomes of the National Education Framework, initially for years 3 to 6 and more recently extended to years 7 and 8. The national delivery guide includes many activities refined by OACT coaches and one devised by Stephen himself as a suitable introductory activity for new starters of all ages.

It is testament to Stephen's ongoing commitment to the work that our sport and our association have developed a strong reputation for providing students of all ages with valuable and enjoyable exposure to a sport that engages body and brain in a fun and non-competitive way.

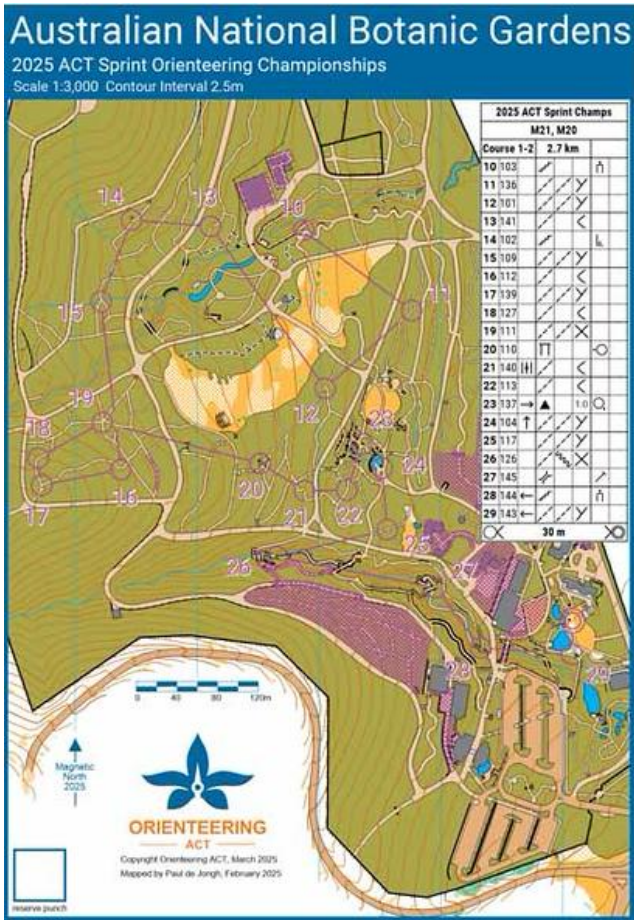
JIM SAWKINS AWARD FOR EVENT MANAGEMENT – Parawanga Club

The 2025 recipient of the ACT Jim Sawkins Award for Services to Event Management is Parawanga Orienteers. The Sprint Championships were held at the Australian National Botanic Gardens (ANBG) on Sunday 16th March 2025.

Engagement with the ANBG's management was initiated by the then OACT President, Susanne Harrysson in mid-2024 and continued throughout that year and into 2025. The ANBG's management set out clear guidelines for areas that could be used with strict conditions that no participants should enter the garden beds. This was entirely understandable given that the ANBG has the world's most comprehensive display of living Australian native plants.

Access to the ANBG for the event and setup was constrained with set times to not interfere with the maintenance activities or peak times for visitors to the Gardens. This required tight planning by the course setter (Bryant Allen), the controller (Phil Walker), the day organisers (Nat Smith & Andy Hogg), and Susanne Harrysson and Jill Walker who liaised with the ANBG's rangers and volunteer staff.

Forever in the minds of the event organisers was the risk of reputational damage if only one participant was seen running across a garden bed. To mitigate the risk the organisers provided numerous briefings on the need to stay out of out of bounds areas, and placed marshals at key points to monitor the runners. Pleasingly there were no reported cases of participants entering the out of bounds areas.

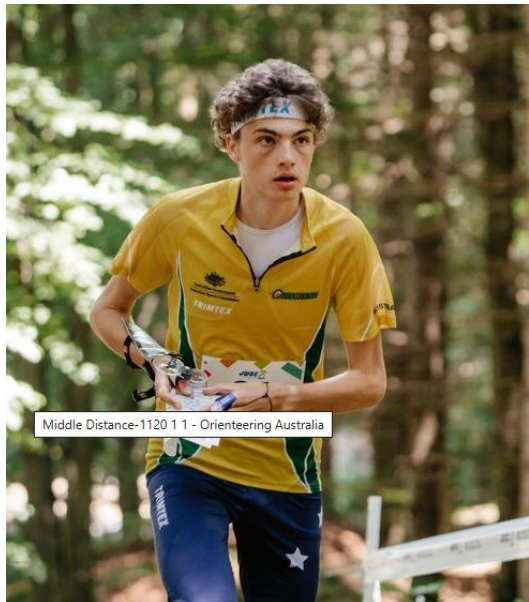


A lot of maintenance work goes on every week at the ANBG, with tracks being repaired, trimming of plants, clearing fallen trees after high winds and garden beds being replanted. Consequently, tracks were closed off or opened to the public at short notice necessitating changes to the map in the fortnight before the event with purple hatching added or removed. Paul de Jongh was called upon in the week before the event to make map changes as areas were closed off as out-of-bounds, and other areas open to access.

The event attracted 205 entries, with dozens travelling from interstate to experience a unique orienteering experience at an iconic location of national significance. The event was an outstanding success thanks to the effort of the organising team to obtain access to the ANBG, running the event in the narrow time period allocated to OACT by the ANBG and the thorough preparations in the months leading up to the event and the ongoing liaison with ANBG staff in the week before and on the day of the event.

Wehner Cup – The Orienteer of the Year Award for 2025

This is awarded to the person achieving the highest number of points in the ACT League competition. The winner for 2025 was David Stocks. The Table below shows the 20 top competing orienteers in the 2025 OACT League program.

Orienteering Australia Awards

OACT members were recognised for their contribution to the sport at the annual Orienteering Australia awards. The following OACT members picked up the majority of the OA awards offered.

- Ann and John Scown were announced as the winners of Orienteering Australia's Silva Award for Services to Orienteering. This award recognises outstanding contribution to the sport at all levels over an extended period.
- Tara Melhuish who received the Silva Award for Services to Coaching. Tara's award recognises her work in coaching the Blue Lightning squad in recent years and the establishment of weekly Tuesday interval training open to all ACT orienteers.
- Marina Iskhakova and Fedor Iskhakov received the David Hogg Medal for Services to Event Management. Marina and Fedor are recognised particularly for their organisation of the 2024 Australian Mountain Bike Orienteering Carnival and also for their important contribution to MTBO generally and ski orienteering over many years.
- Valerie Barker received the award for Services to the Australian Schools Orienteering Championships (ASOC). While the formal criteria for this award recognise ten years of dedicated service, Valerie's contribution to orienteering stretches for more than two decades. She has been a constant and trusted presence in our volunteer community, particularly in junior development and as a cornerstone of Australia's high-performance pathway. Valerie has served as Manager of the Australian Junior World Orienteering Championships team on multiple occasions, providing stability, care and guidance that have helped our young athletes perform with confidence on the world stage. She has also played a key role in managing Australian junior teams during international competitions and exchanges with New Zealand, helping to grow skills, friendships and experience for our youngest competitors. Her commitment to juniors continues today through her ongoing mentoring roles.

Coaching & Development

• Schools Coaching and Participants – Stephen Goggs

Unfortunately, 2025 was the slowest year for school bookings in the last decade. It is not clear why this has happened, but a likely significant contributor is the ever-expanding list of sports that schools can choose from when applying for Sporting Schools funding. Five years ago, there were 27 sports – now there are 45! ‘Small sports’ like ours tend to fall into the category of “let’s try something different this time”, so each time a new small sport gets added to the list of options, other small sports lose out. There were no jobs at all in term 2. It is doubly frustrating as our program is always very positively received when we deliver in schools and this year we have had two ready, willing and able overseas coaches-in-residence in town ready to meet the hoped for demand. In the end we delivered 13 programs – all of them to repeat customers, with 720 encounters involving 2731 participants (down from 20/958/3545 in 2024). Thanks go especially to Owen Radajewski for stepping up to the coaching plate in term 1, Hedda Kärner Grooss for covering almost all our jobs in terms 3 and 4, and to Toni Brown for her ongoing relationship and work with Girls Grammar Junior School.

• SC-ORE and Learn to Orienteer (L2O) – Susanne Harrysson

SC-ORE: Spring SC-ORE 2025 went ahead with the highest number (116) of participants since COVID. Autumn SC-ORE 2025 wasn't as well attended but still had 64 participants. Autumn SC-ORE is usually harder to attract participants because it commences early in the new school year. New for the Sprint SC-ORE was that parents had the opportunity to try one course themselves before the kids went out on their courses. This was very appreciated both among parents and children. Many adults realised that it was harder than they thought. (22 parents tried it). This year we also offered membership to OACT to the participants, for the end of 2025 and 2026. 80 people opted in.

Prior to SC-ORE, in September, a Come & Try SC-ORE event was held for the first time, at Aranda PS. This was successful and the majority signed up to SC-ORE and one to L2O. Also new for this series was the introduction of QR-codes for entries, both for Come & Try and SC-ORE itself.

As always, orienteering events are not possible without volunteers, and SC-ORE is no exception. So, one more time, a big thank you to all SC-ORE volunteers, School staff and to Paul de Jongh (OACT Admin) for excellent support. Regular volunteers were: Bill Jones, Ken Mansell, Bryant Allen, Valerie Barker, Stephen Goggs, Cath Chalmers, Chris Stocks, David Stocks, Frank Ingwersen, Andrew Cheffers, Rosie Goggs, Hedda Groos, Julie Fomasi, Max Walter and Mike Radajewski. Learn to Orienteer: During 2025 OACT ran two 7-weeks Learn to Orienteer (L2O) programs, one in conjunction with the Saturday Metro Series and one in conjunction with the Wednesday Twilight series. Like previous years, adults (mostly parents) did not need to pay if accompanying a child(ren). (Juniors under 18 years need a responsible adult to be present.) We still encourage everyone to take an active part in the program. There were 21 paying participants for the first L2O program and 30 for the second program; (13 juniors/8 adults, 13 juniors/17 adults). Most of the participants also took part in the regular Metro/Twilight events after the L2O sessions, and some continued after completing the program.

In February-April OACT also ran three intensive L2O programs; (8, 8 and 10 participants respectively). The majority of these participants wanted to learn basic map reading skills including how to use a compass and initially had no intention of continuing with orienteering. However, a few people have continued on a regular basis after these sessions.

Reflection when looking back at the turn out from the L2O programs (first program was held end of 2023), many of the participants have not continued with orienteering in the ACT, however, there are several regular orienteers that started orienteering through L2O. L2O is a real success story, introducing newcomers to the sport even if it is an awareness for some and an ongoing sport for others.



Coaches in Residence: OACT has had the pleasure of welcoming two Coaches in Residence, Hedda Groos Kärner from Denmark and Julie Fomasi from Switzerland this year. They have both provided coaching, set up training sessions and alternative training exercises as well as being part of the coaching team for Learn to Orienteer and the Sporting School coaching program. For the Twilight series they have provided alternative training maps for the Moderate 1 and 2 courses, giving participants the opportunity to train specific navigation skills. Hedda also set courses for and ran a winter sprint series. Julie, who arrived later in the year has provided training maps and training opportunities for our members, as well as individual coaching. The first sessions of the Summer Sprint series, they ran welcoming initial coaching sessions for beginners to help them get started with sprint orienteering. All very appreciated.

Australian Schools Orienteering Championship – ACT Schools

A strong ACT team of 20 students travelled to Brisbane to compete at the 2025 Australian Schools Championships, part of the 2025 Australian Championships Carnival which comprised seven races over nine days. The team was managed by Peter Miller and Sarah Bruce, and coached by David Stocks.

After challenging selection trials earlier this year, students were selected to compete in one of four Schools Championship classes: junior (12-15 yrs) and senior (16-19 yrs), boys and girls. Other teams represented each state and territory (except NT), and two New Zealand teams also competed against the Australian teams in the Southern Cross Junior Challenge.

Always a highlight of the orienteering calendar, preparations and planning for ASOC began early. Map-geeking and lots of relevant training in the preceding months gave the students plenty of time to create ambitious goals both individually and for the team.

The ACT Team delivered upon these ambitions with a very successful 2025 Australian Championships campaign, winning the ASOC trophy (convincingly over TAS, and NSW who have wielded it for the past 6 years), and becoming the only Australian team ever to get their name etched on the Southern Cross Junior Challenge Trophy (in a tie with NZ Harua).

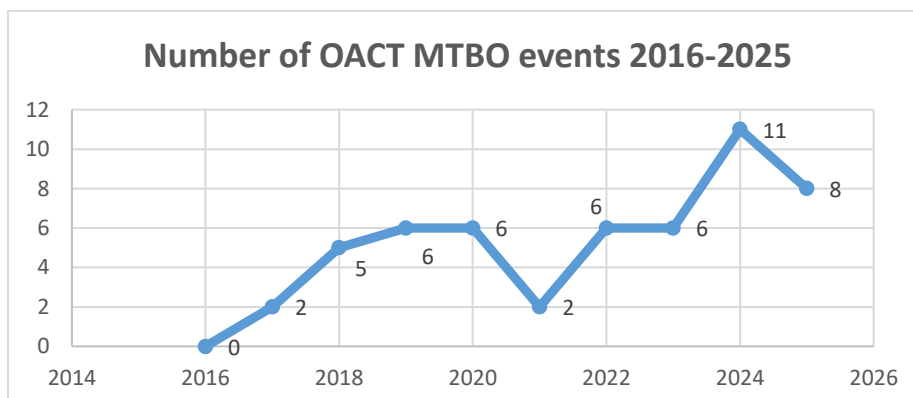

Mountain Bike Orienteering (MTBO) – Marina Iskhakova

2025 was another busy year, following on from the huge effort in 2024 organising the Australian MTBO Championships. The OACT MTBO Team arranged 8 events in 2025. Two new MTBO maps were produced (Fadden Pines and Arboretum) and two MTBO maps at East Kowen were fully updated.

In total 10 OACT people worked on MTBO Courses as a Course Setter/Course Controller: 7 as Course Setters and 5 as Course Controllers. The list of events, locations and key personnel is below.

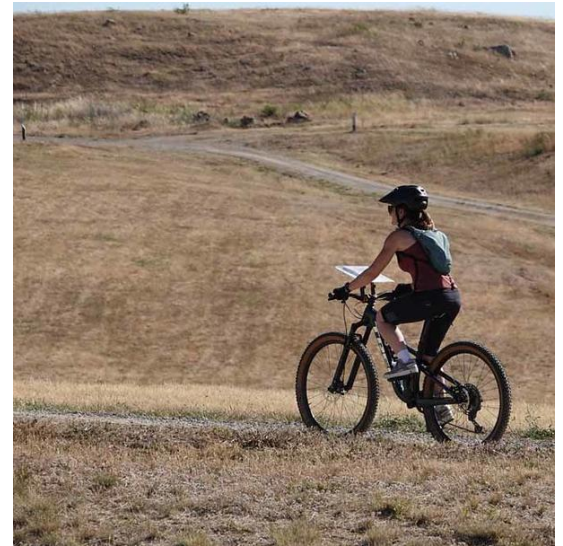

The highlights of the year were the ACT MTBO Championships and the first MTBO Event at the National Arboretum, where after two years of progress, the permit was finally been granted.

Main Priorities for Future Development of MTBO in ACT for 2026 - 2027

1. To bring more Juniors (12-20) to the sport.
2. To continue increasing number of MTBO Course Setters/Controllers (2-3 new people per year).
3. To continue increasing number of MTBO maps (1-2 new maps per year, 25 MTBO maps in ACT by 2028).
4. To increase number of MTBO events per year from 8 in 2025 to 9-10 in 2027.
5. To increase number of female athletes in the sport by 2028.
6. To reach a stable number of 50-60 MTBO participants per event in 2026 with 10 regular events per year.
7. Development of succession planning: Marina has been coordinating MTBO since 2017 in Canberra, so the plan is to prepare a new skilled MTBO Coordinator by 2027-2030, so a long-term EOI is welcomed.



Ski Orienteering – Marina Iskhakova

The 2025 ACT & NSW Ski-Orienteering Championship was held at Perisher Valley on Sunday 17 August, organised by Red Roos, Big Foot, and Perisher X Country (XC). It was the 10th Championship, after Swedish ski-orienteering (ski-O) expert Patrik Gunnarsson brought the concept back to Perisher in 2014. There were no events in 2020-2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. It is the only ski-O event in Australia and among the only few in the Southern Hemisphere. This event is warmly supported by Perisher XC with the start in front of the beautiful, warm and special Nordic Shelter at Perisher.

Sam Wilson was the Course Setter for this year's Champs. Three excellent courses were designed: Long (13km); Middle (9km); Short (5km). Organisers Marina and Fedor Iskhakov provided assistance in planning and throughout the event. 30 entries was a great success for this year, as accommodation and logistics at Perisher complicates and gets less affordable year by year. On another side many avid downhill skiers consider switching to XC skiing, which is much more affordable and consistent through the short winter season.

Tash Thackray came the whole way from Perth, WA to do this iconic O-event. She said that she simply couldn't miss this beautiful orienteering experience in the mountains and also is committed to improving her XC skiing skills. This year a record number of Ski-O Beginners, people who have never tried XC skiing before entered the event. Many were very confident in Orienteering and took on a new learning experience and on a new outdoor adventure.



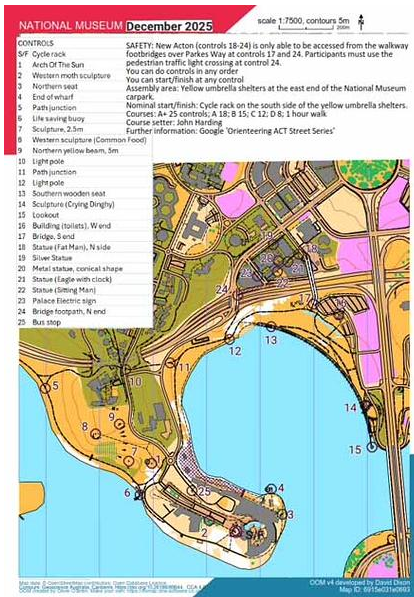
Street Orienteering – John Harding

A total of 45 street orienteering events were conducted in 2025, two fewer than in 2024. There were 1,896 participations from the 45 events, representing 19.6% of the total participations at OACT events in 2025. This represented a decline on the 2,345 participations in 2024 and was well down on the peak of 2,649 in 2022, in part due to the welcome popularity of both OACT’s extended Sunday Sprint Series and the Learn to Orienteer programs at OACT bush events.

All street orienteering events were smartphone/smartwatch MapRun score events; a small number of orienteers without MapRun-compliant phones were still able to participate using an honesty system to visit controls and self report their results. The manual backup was also used when participants using smartphones or smartwatches had technology failures while doing their events. Lawrie Brown contributed greatly to publishing the MapRun courses and setting courses himself, with Jon Glanville providing backup when Lawrie was away. Nikolaus Elz processed the combined MapRun and self-reported results for download to a template which John Harding uploaded to the national results database on Eventor.



To keep the street orienteering program refreshed, new maps were used by course setter John Harding at Strathnairn, the National Museum/New Acton, and Narrabundah East, and by Jennifer Webb at Taylor and Chris Andersen at Reid. Most suitable Canberra suburbs now have Street O maps and provide a year-round schedule of events; a Thursday to Monday start time window was used for each event to maximise participation, with beginners and orienteers seeking social engagement encouraged to participate on Monday afternoons during a 5pm to 6.15pm start window. A Street O newsletter is produced after nearly every event to encourage participation, both in Street O but also in other OACT events. With the high ACT usage of MapRun, OACT contributed \$1500 to the running costs of the national MapRun database.

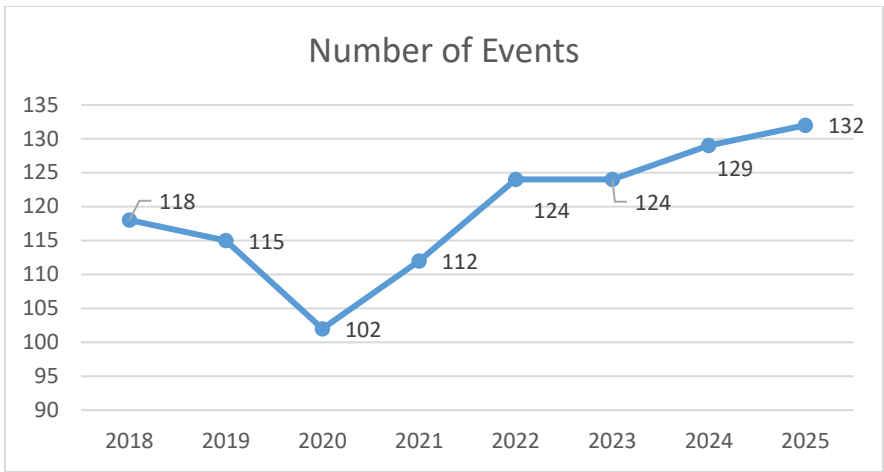

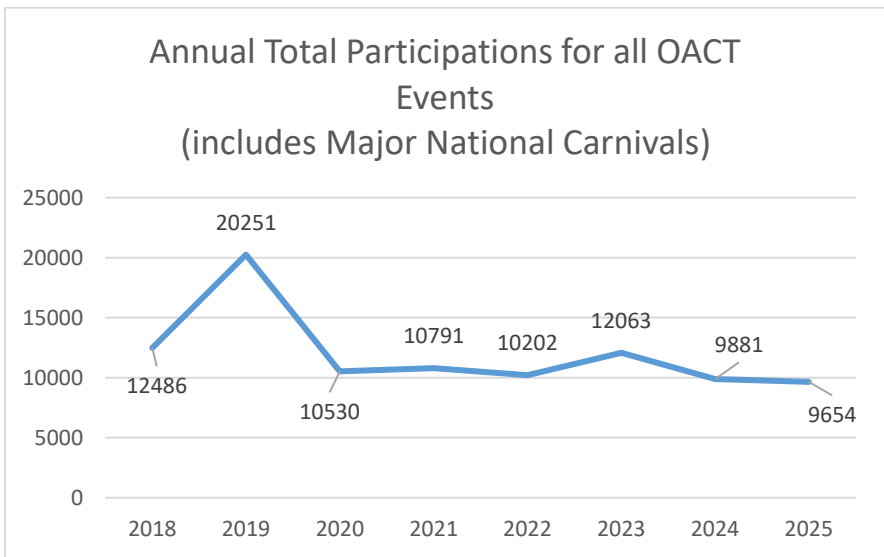
The Total Participations and Average Participations per event in 2025 are slightly down on previous years, due to OACT not hosting a major national Championship Carnival. When looking at events, other than major national Championships, participation numbers are similar to previous post-COVID years. The annual participations have settled around 9000-10000 as the post COVID norm. This is 20% down on pre-COVID numbers, particularly for the Saturday Metro and Wednesday Twilight series.

Once again there has been excellent take-up by members purchasing Season Passes across the program of events. This eases the day-to-day administration for event organisers and offers 40% discount on event entry fees across a series of events.

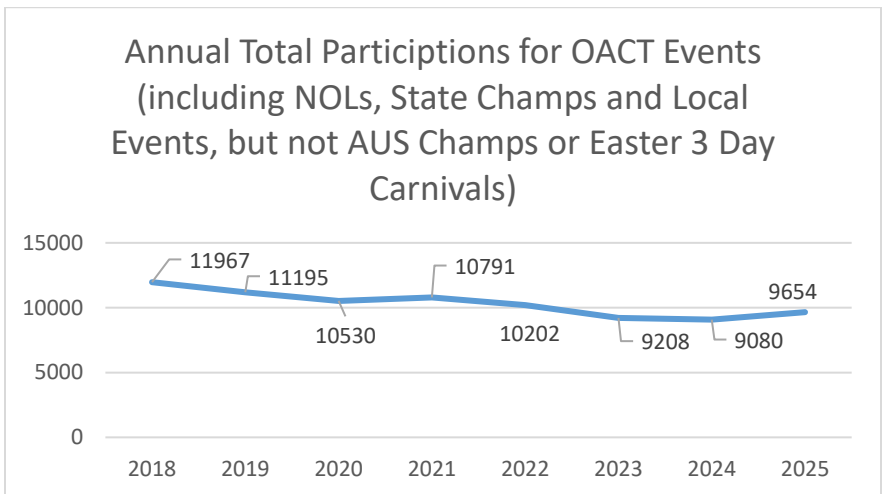

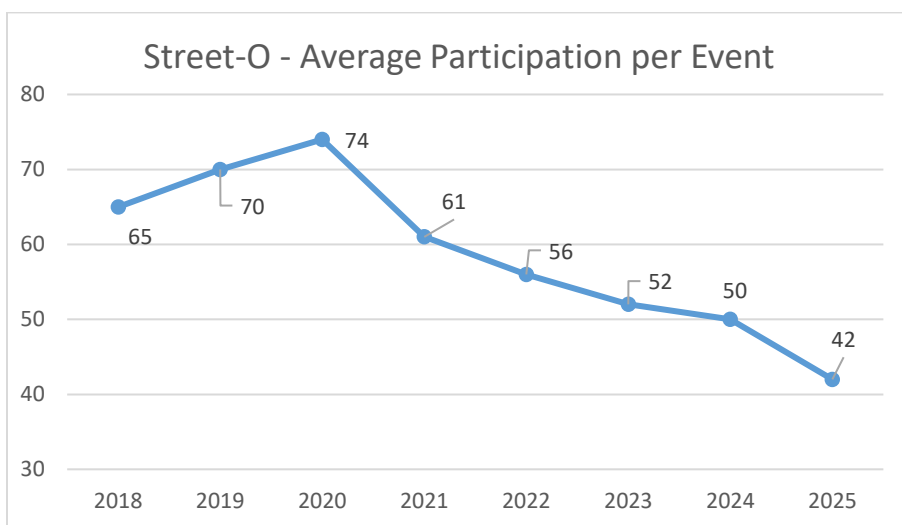
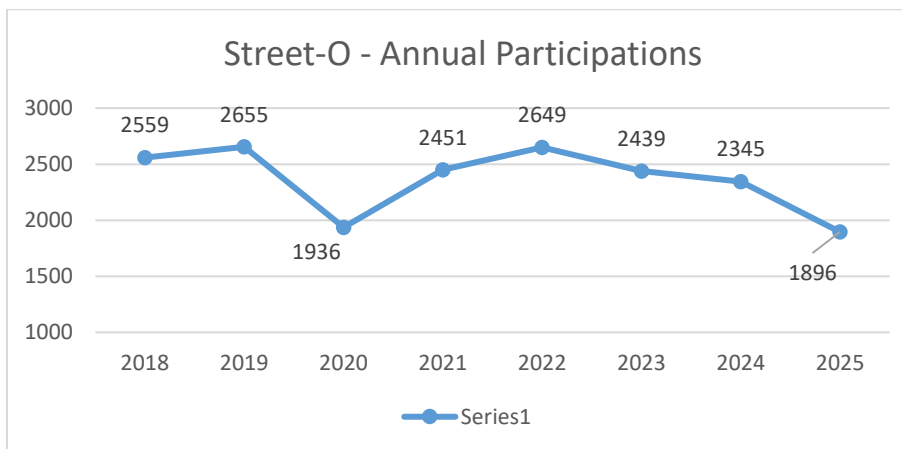
Note: Aside from major national Championship events, the best attended and most competitive events are those run by OACT in conjunction with the National Orienteering League or the ONSW State League.



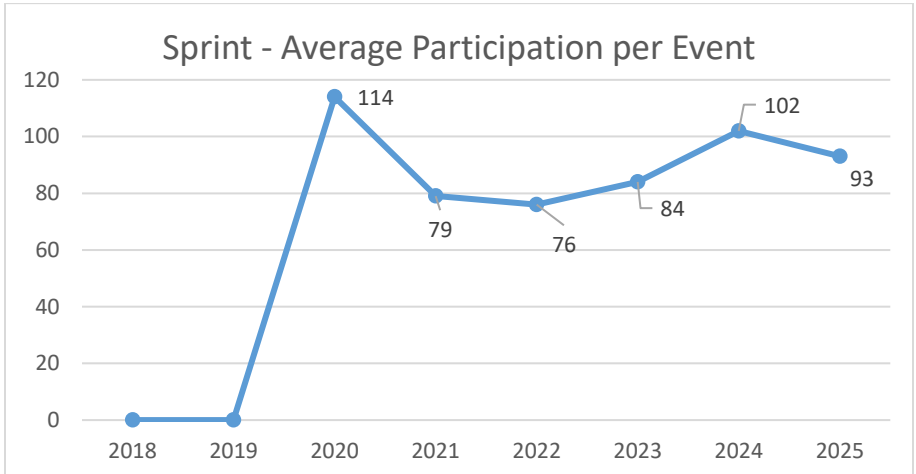
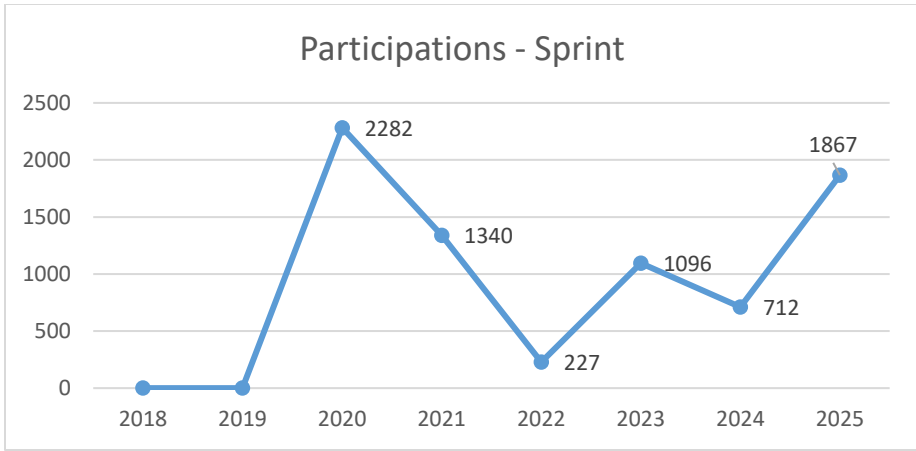

The drop in participations for Wednesday Twilight seems to be a combination of factors: hot weather, locations that have become less suitable for orienteering, overuse of locations, drop in quality of events, and time seems now to be less convenient for families.



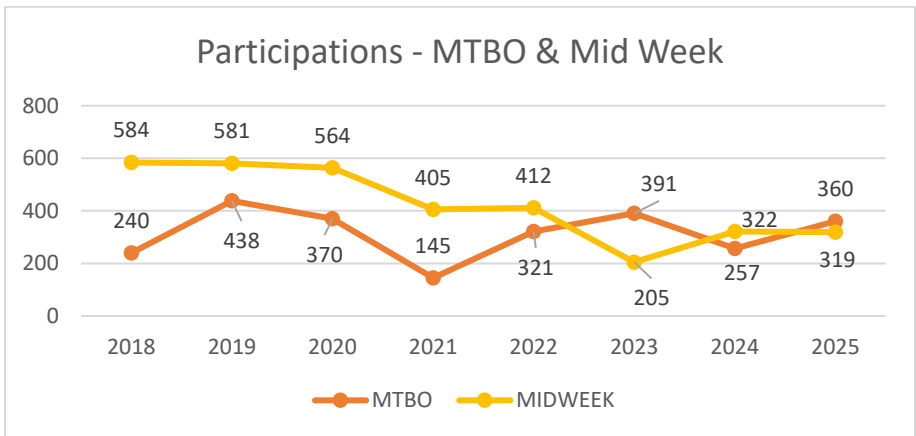

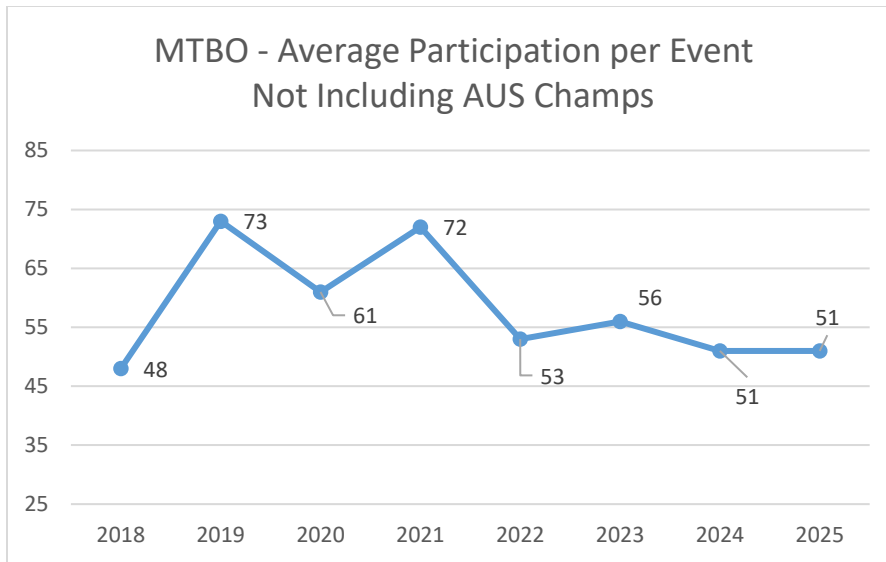

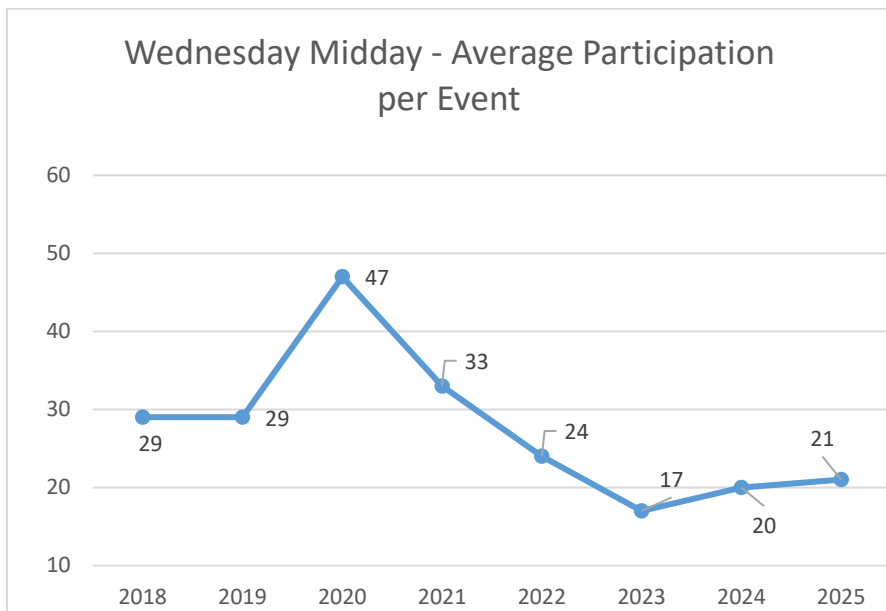

The success of the sprints is dependent on continued access to schools, campuses and institutions.

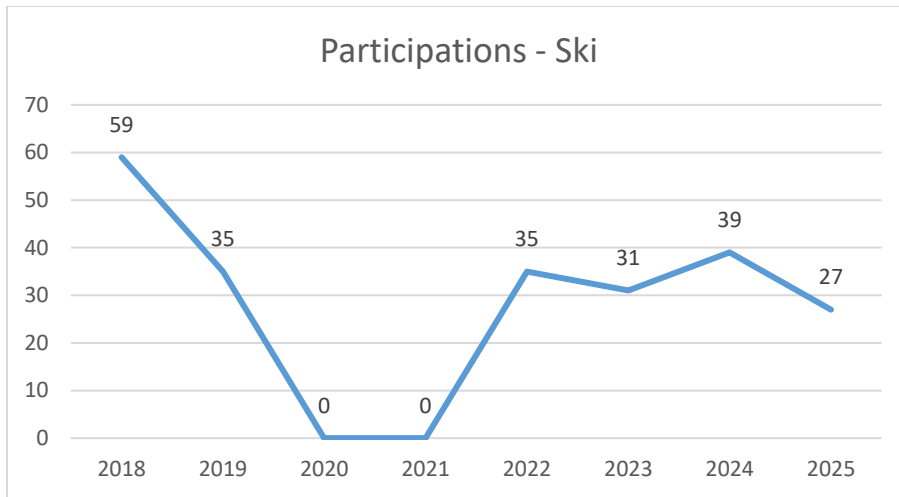

Note: Wednesday Midday events from May – September appeal to a small group, of mostly the older orienteers. There is a question mark on the viability of running these events as it does take effort and the numbers attending are low. The situation for the past couple of years has been if there are volunteers who want to run these events, at no detriment to resources and effort for other mainstream events, then the Wednesday midday series will continue.

The data on participations by Gender and Age came from 9654 participations where Gender and Age were recorded. There were 1238 participations where Age and/or Gender were not recorded, which is an improvement on previous years data. These participants are typically for events such as Street-O, SC-ORE and Come-and-Try.

There were 1287 names recorded for participation in OACT held events in 2025. This is not the same as unique participants because it includes teams where some team members may also be individual entrants for other events. The number of unique participants is difficult to determine with total accuracy, but it is estimated to be around 1100.

Of the 1287 entries, 425 did 5 or more events. It can be surmised that OACT had about 425 regular orienteers. The other 862 entrants were made up of interstate orienteers attending less than 5 OACT events plus casual orienteers who attended infrequently.

269 participants attended 10 or more events, compared to 264 for 2024. 148 attended 20 or more events; 95 attended 30 or more events; 45 attended 40 or more events, and 25 attended 50 or more events.
